



For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.





MUSIC NOTES

Margaret Vardell Sandresky (b. 1921) is a Winston-Salem, NC based composer who has written many pieces for the organ. "God Is Our Refuge and Strength" is based on Psalm 46 and was written in memory of 9/11. A quiet plaintive opening leads into a more hopeful section. As the piece gathers momentum, the organ gets louder and finishes triumphantly.

The anthem at the offering "Dear Lord and Father of Mankind" is a choral setting of the hymn of the same title set to the tune "Repton" by English composer Charles Hubert Hastings Parry (1848-1918). He is most famous for the choral song "Jerusalem" and his 1902 setting for the coronation anthem "I was glad." English hymnologist J.R. Watson summarizes well the contribution of this hymn: "It is the opposite end of the devotional spectrum from those hymns which encourage activity and energy; but everyone experiences the need for quiet meditation at some time, and this hymn encourages an almost mystical contemplation of the peace of God 'which passes all understanding.""

Craig Phillips is a distinguished and popular American composer and organist and Director of Music at All Saints' Church, Beverly Hills. His choral and organ music is heard Sunday by Sunday in churches and cathedrals across the United States, and many of his works have been performed in concert throughout North America, Europe and Asia. His setting of the hymn tune "Crucifer" interjects interesting harmonies and rhythms to the heroic tune.

Upcoming Commemorations

John Chrysostom, Bishop of Constantinople, died 407

Monday, September 13, 2021

John was a priest in Antioch and an outstanding preacher. His eloquence earned him the nickname "Chrysostom" ("golden mouth"). Appointed bishop of Constantinople, seat of the empire, he criticized corruption in the court. As a result, he was exiled by the empress.

Holy Cross Day

Tuesday, September 14, 2021

Helena, mother of Constantine, made a pilgrimage to the Holy Land and found what may be the actual site of Jesus' crucifixion. Her son built two churches there, and the dedication of one of them gave rise to this celebration of our Lord's victory on the cross.

Cyprian, Bishop of Carthage, martyr, died around 258

Thursday, September 16, 2021

Cyprian served as a bishop during a time of great persecution of Christians. He insisted on receiving back those who had left the faith under duress. He also provided medical care during a severe epidemic.

Hildegard, Abbess of Bingen, died 1179 *Friday, September 17, 2021*

A mystic who was widely influential within the church, Hildegard advised and reproved kings and popes, wrote poems and hymns, and produced treatises in medicine, theology, and natural history. She was also a musician and artist.

Dag Hammarskjöld, renewer of society, died 1961

Saturday, September 18, 2021

A Swedish diplomat, Hammarskjöld served as the second Secretary General of the United Nations until his death in a plane crash while trying to negotiate peace in present-day Zambia. His journal, published as Markings, revealed the depth of his Christian faith.
