The choir introduces the antiphon; please sing the second time. The choir then alternates with the congregation on the verses. Subsequent refrains are sung only once by all, indicated by the word **Antiphon**.

The words at the beginning of a verse are chanted on the reciting tone, a whole note breve. The word or words in the [square brackets] are then chanted on the first quarter note, and the words beyond the [brackets] fall naturally on the second quarter note and final half note.





Gospel John 11:32-44

The Holy Gospel according to Saint John, the eleventh chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

Through the raising of Lazarus, Jesus offers the world a vision of the life to come, when death and weeping will be no more.

When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. He said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Lord, come and see." Jesus began to weep. So the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" Holy Baptism (11:15 only)

INTRODUCTION

Upcoming Commemorations

John Christian Frederick Heyer, died 1873; Bartholomaeus Ziegenbalg, died 1719; Ludwig Nommensen, died 1918; missionaries *Sunday, November 7, 2021*

Heyer was the first missionary sent out by American Lutherans. After teaching at Gettysburg College and Seminary he was assigned to the Andhra region of India. A worker among the Tamil people on the southeast coast of India, Ziegenbalg was opposed both by local Hindus and by Danish authorities who favored a different missionary style. He was known for caring about the welfare of the whole person. Nommensen was born in northern Germany and was sent to Sumatra as a Lutheran missionary. Working among the Batak people, he translated the scriptures into their language, and honored their native culture.

Martin, Bishop of Tours, died 397 *Thursday, November 11, 2021*

Martin's pagan father enlisted him in the Roman army. Approached by a beggar, Martin cut his cloak in half and gave part to the man, whom he later understood as representing Christ. He asked to leave the army, but was jailed instead. After his release, he became a preacher, and later a bishop.

Søren Aabye Kierkegaard, teacher, died 1855 *Thursday, November 11, 2021*

Kierkegaard was a Danish theologian whose writings also gave rise to the modern philosophy of existentialism. He frequently attacked the complacency of the state church of his day, as well as its desire to be accepted by polite society rather than be a stumbling block.

HYMN NOTES

Rejoice in God's Saints

Fred Pratt Green (1903-2000)

Fred Pratt Green gave us a fresh hymn for All Saints' Day. Rather than elevating saints to a realm beyond the earthly, Pratt Green, in the words of UM Hymnal editor, the Rev. Carlton Young, "describes the importance of saints and how they interact with the world." Dr. Young notes that this hymn is a conflation of "two processional hymns that Pratt Green had written for the six-hundredth anniversary celebration of [Julian of Norwich's] Revelations of Divine Love (1373), commissioned by the Dean of Norwich Cathedral."British hymnal editor and composer John Wilson advised Pratt Green to explore the lives and influence of the saints beyond the cloistered life led by many, showing how saints relate to common life.

For all the saints

William W. How (1823-1897)

Based on the picture of a "cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12:1), the hymn gives thanks for the saints of old, makes a prayer that we may be found faithful, and acknowledges the unity of the whole Church in heaven and on earth in the mystical body of Christ, a picture of the church in holy warfare, and a vision of the victorious Church. Vaughan Williams' magnificent tune makes this a contemporary version of "When the saints go marching in."

Rejoice, ye pure in heart

Edward H. Plumptre (1821-1891)

Everyone enjoys a festival, and this hymn was written for a Diocesan Festival in Peterborough Cathedral in 1865. It originally contained eleven stanzas, necessary to get all of the choirs in. Based on Psalm 20:4, Psalm 147:1, and Philippians 4:4, it is a call for youth, the elderly, men, maidens—everyone to rejoice.

MUSIC NOTES

Variations on 'Sine Nomine' was commissioned for the 100th anniversary of the parish of St Andrew and St Mark in Dorval, Quebec, and premiered on November 1st 1998 by the organist, William Hutton. Based on the Anglican hymn (*For all the saints*), it consists of five sections, with contrasting characters and timbres: *Maestoso, Allegro Moderato, Très calme, Allegro non troppo, Maestoso.*

Pie Jesu of French composer Gabriel Fauré is the fifth movement from the seven-movement Requiem Mass scored for soprano and baritone soloists, mixed choir, orchestra and organ. This movement is originally scored for soprano and orchestral accompaniment. Today a few female singers sing a two-part arrangement.

French organist and composer Maurice Duruflé wrote his Suite for organ in 1932 and is dedicated to fellow composer Paul Dukas. The Toccata is one of the finest examples of its genre found in the French organ repertoire. It combines the dazzling technical demands expected of any toccata with long, lyrical melodies that give unusual warmth to a technician's ultimate challenge.

MUSIC MINISTRY UPCOMING EVENTS

All Saints Choral Evensong TONIGHT November 7 at 5 PM

Sung at the close of day in Cathedrals and churches throughout the world, Choral Evensong is a service of Evening Prayer, derived from the ancient offices of Vespers and Compline. The choir sings the traditional evening prayers of the church that have been offered for centuries, while the congregation listens, joins in the hymns, and adds their own prayers to those of the choir. It is an opportunity for peaceful meditation in the midst of a busy week. There will be an extended prelude written by Belgian composer César Franck that will start 15 minutes before the service begins.

Wickre Organ Concert November 21 at 5 PM

Thomas Sheehan, Organist and Associate Director of Music at the National Cathedral in Washington, DC, will present an innovative organ program on November 21, 2021 at 5 PM. The concert will be in person and current health guidelines will be observed (masks and social distancing required). Pieces in the program will include a transcription of the Overture to St. Paul by Felix Mendelssohn, Five Dances of Calvin Hampton, and works by Thomas Oboe Lee, Angela Kraft Cross, Trevor Weston, and Dietrich Buxtehude.
