Reading

Hebrews 10:11-14 [15-18] 19-25

Images of worship and sacrifice are used throughout Hebrews to highlight what Christ has uniquely accomplished through his death. Because we have received forgiveness through Christ's death, we live with sincere hearts by trusting in God's promises and encouraging love and good works from each other.

Every priest stands day after day at his service, offering again and again the same sacrifices that can never take away sins. But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, "he sat down at the right hand of God," and since then has been waiting "until his enemies would be made a footstool for his feet." For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are sanctified. And the Holy Spirit also testifies to us,

for after saying, "This is the covenant that I will make with them after those days, says the Lord: I will put my laws in their hearts, and I will write them on their minds,"

he also adds,

"I will remember their sins and their lawless deeds no more." Where there is forgiveness of these, there is no longer any offering for sin.

Therefore, my friends, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain (that is, through his flesh), and since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us approach with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

Gospel

The Holy Gospel according to Saint Mark, the thirteenth chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

In the last week of his life, Jesus warned his disciples concerning trials that were to come upon them and upon the world. He exhorts the listener: Do not be alarmed.

As [Jesus] came out of the temple, one of his disciples said to him, "Look, Teacher, what large stones and what large buildings!" Then Jesus asked him, "Do you see these great buildings? Not one stone will be left here upon another; all will be thrown down."

Wickre Organ Concert November 21 at 5 PM

Advent Compline December 5 at 5 PM

Join us for an Office of Compline for Advent. Compline also known as Complin, Night Prayer, or the Prayers at the End of the Day, is the final church service (or office) of the day in the Christian tradition of canonical hours, which are prayed at fixed prayer times. Compline tends to be a contemplative office that emphasizes spiritual peace. The service is particularly appropriate to the season of Advent and its overarching themes of waiting, preparedness, and expectation. HYMN NOTES

Through the night of doubt and sorrow

Bernhardt Severin Ingemann, 1789-1862

The Danish author of this hymn was both a scholar and a writer of popular historical novels modeled after those by Sir Walter Scott. He also edited the official Danish hymnal of 1859, where the hymn first appeared. The imagery is that of the Israelite's journey to the promised land, given a Christian interpretation, and applied to the pilgrim Church on earth. The use of the word "one" is paramount: one goal, one faith, one hope, one song, one conflict, one march, and one song of gladness at the end of the journey.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

My Lord, What a Morning

African American spiritual

The numerous apocalyptic images in this hymn have scriptural foundations. Note, for example, the symbolic "trumpet": 1 Corinthians 15:52, "In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump: for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed" (KJV, emphasis added.) A companion text is I Thessalonians 4:16-17: "For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord" (KJV, emphasis added).

"The falling stars" is a particularly powerful metaphor. Revelation 6:12-14 provides a stark description of the end of the world: "And I beheld when he had opened the sixth seal, and, lo, there was a great earthquake; and the sun became black as sackcloth of hair, and the moon became as blood; And the stars of heaven fell unto the earth, even as a fig tree casteth her untimely figs, when she is shaken of a mighty wind. And the heaven departed as a scroll when it is rolled together; and every mountain and island were moved out of their places" (KJV, emphasis added).

The anonymous hymn and the spiritual share these primary images. Another prominent image is the reference, "nations underground," a vision of global humanity on earth, under the ground of heaven, viewed from the perspective of heaven, the source of the trumpet's sound.—*C. Michael Hawn*

Peace Like a River

Horatio Gates Spafford, 1828-1888

Knowing that his friend Dwight L. Moody was going to be preaching in evangelistic campaigns in England in the fall of 1871, Horatio G. Spafford decided to take his family to England. His wife and four daughters went ahead on the SS Ville du Havre, and he planned to follow in a few days.

But on the Atlantic Ocean the ship was struck by an iron sailing vessel and sank within twelve minutes. Two hundred and twenty-six lives were lost—including the Spaffords' four daughters. When the survivors were brought to shore at Cardiff, Wales, Mrs. Spafford cabled her husband, "Saved alone."

Spafford booked passage on the next ship. As they were crossing the Atlantic, the captain pointed out the place where he thought the *Ville du Havre* had gone down. That night, Spafford penned the words "When sorrows like sea billows roll...it is well, it is well with my soul." - The One Year Book of Hymns

MUSIC NOTES

Both prelude pieces are simple arrangements of *It is well with my soul* and *My Lord what a morning* by American organists and composers Craig Philips and Franklin Ashdown.

The choral anthem today sets the words from Romans 8 and Psalm 16 for a two-part choir in a gentle manner by American composer Carlton T. Russell. he Rev. Carlton T. Russell is Professor of Music and College Organist, Emeritus at Wheaton College in Norton, Massachusetts, where he taught for 41 years. An Episcopal priest, Dr. Russell holds degrees from Amherst College, Princeton University, and The Episcopal Divinity School, and the Choirmaster (Ch.M.) certificate of The American Guild of Organists.

The postlude is a setting of the hymn tune EBENEZER. The fantasia like piece sets the hymn tune on a prominent reed sound (in our case that is the horizontal trumpet at the back of the church). The piece then develops a theme derived from the hymn tune in the accompanying foundations stops.
