Word

First Reading

Zephaniah 3:14-20

The prophet Zephaniah's message is mostly one of judgment for sin. This reading, however, which comes from the conclusion of the book, prophesies joy for Judah and Jerusalem. Judgment has led to repentance, and God's salvation is at hand.

Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout, O Israel! Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! The Lord has taken away the judgments against you, he has turned away your enemies. The king of Israel, the Lord, is in your midst; you shall fear disaster no more. On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem: Do not fear, O Zion; do not let your hands grow weak. The Lord, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory; he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love; he will exult over you with loud singing as on a day of festival. I will remove disaster from you, so that you will not bear reproach for it. I will deal with all your oppressors at that time. And I will save the lame and gather the outcast, and I will change their shame into praise and renown in all the earth. At that time I will bring you home, at the time when I gather you; for I will make you renowned and praised among all the peoples of the earth, when I restore your fortunes before your eyes, says the Lord.

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire." And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."

The Holy Gospel according to Saint Luke, the third chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

John the Baptist heralds the mighty one who is coming. John teaches that preparation for God's reign is not a matter of identity but of bearing fruits of merciful justice, radical generosity, and vocational integrity.

Upcoming Commemorations

Lucy, martyr, died 304 Monday, December 13, 2021

Lucy was a young Christian of Sicily who was martyred during the persecutions under Emperor Diocletian. Her celebration became particularly important in Sweden and Norway, perhaps because the feast of Lucia (whose name means "light") originally fell on the shortest day of the year.

John of the Cross, renewer of the church, died 1591

Tuesday, December 14, 2021

John was a member of the Carmelite monastic order, and worked to reform it. His writings reflect a deep interest in mystical thought and meditation.

Las Posadas (LLC) Thursday, December 16, 2021

This celebration, long popular in Mexico, takes its name from the "posadas," or lodgings, sought by Mary and Joseph in Bethlehem. Their search is reenacted in a neighborhood, unsuccessfully, until finally they are welcomed in, and a party commences.

HYMN NOTES

O Lord, How Shall I Meet You

Paul Gerhardt, 1607-1676

If Martin Luther was the mind of German hymnwriting, Paul Gerhardt was its heart. Gerhardt wrote devotional songs of love and commitment—133 hymns in all, including "Jesus, Thy Boundless Love to Me." Not that Gerhardt's life was all peaceful contemplation. Far from it! Like many other hymnwriters of his era, he faced the Thirty Years' War, which devastated Germany. Four of his children died in infancy, and he lost his wife after only thirteen years of marriage. Gerhardt also walked a rocky road professionally. He was a popular Lutheran pastor, but after defying an order of the secular ruler, Elector Frederick William I, he was banished from his thriving ministry in Berlin. In spite of his troubles, his hymns still ring with love for the Lord. He seemed truly to strive "to do in spirit lowly all that may please" the Lord. (The One Year Book of Hymns)

As the Dark Awaits the Dawn

Rejoice, Rejoice, Believers

Laurentius Laurenti, 1660-1722

Laurenti, considered one of the finest of pietistic hymn writers, wrote a set of texts and tunes for the entire church year. This hymn, based on Matthew 25:1-13 (the story of the wise and foolish virgins) originally was intended for a Sunday in Trinity, but it usually included in the Advent section. It is a call for us to be prepared to greet the Bridegroom (Jesus) whose coming is imminent.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

MUSIC NOTES

Today the two prelude pieces are based on the Swedish fold melody HAF TRONES LAMPA FARDIG. Burkhardt's arrangement includes a ritornello alternating with phrases of the melody played on a contrasting combination of sounds. After a brief key modulation the original accompaniment figure makes a come back and finishes the piece. Blersch's arrangement is a joyous march-like setting of the hymn tune played on a trumpet stop.

Today's anthem is an arrangement of the hymn "Comfort, Ye My People" written by American organist and composer John Ferguson. The a cappella arrangement features a ritornelle played on the organ in between each verse of the hymn.

The postlude is another arrangement of the hymn "Rejoice, Recoice Believers," written by American organist and composer Franklin Ashdown. His setting starts with a straightforward harmonization of the hymn tune. After a modulation the tune is repeated in the new key with some added notes in the melody. A new counter melody in a minor key leads into the original key and a louder statement of the hymn tune.
