



First Reading Micah 5:2-5a





Second Reading Hebrews 10:5-10

The author of Hebrews uses the image of religious sacrifice to convey the significance of Christ's coming. Through obedient acceptance of God's will, Christ allows his own body to become the greatest sacrifice of all, one through which we are made a holy people.

Consequently, when Christ came into the world, he said, "Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, but a body you have prepared for me; in burnt offerings and sin offerings you have taken no pleasure. Then I said, 'See, God, I have come to do your will, O God' (in the scroll of the book it is written of me)."

When he said above, "You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings" (these are offered according to the law), then he added, "See, I have come to do your will." He abolishes the first in order to establish the second. And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.

Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is for those who fear him from

generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty. He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants forever."

HYMN NOTES

O come, O come Emmanuel

Latin, 12th century

From the seven antiphons sung in the medieval Roman Church at Vespers before and after the Magnificat (Mary's Song), just prior to Christmas, sometime in the 13th century five were selected for a hymn and the "Rejoice, rejoice" refrain added. Biblical references to the Great "O's" are: Emmanuel (Isaiah 7:14), Root of Jesse (Isaiah 11:10), Dayspring (Malachi 4:2), Key of David (Isaiah 22:22), and O Lord (Adonai) (Exodus 3:15). The purpose of Advent is to prepare for Christmas, as Lent prepares for Easter.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Creator of the stars of night

Anon. Latin, 9th century

The Latin original, found in a ninth century manuscript in Bern, Switzerland, was appointed to be sung on certain days during Advent. In stanza two there is more than a hint of the hymn "At the name of Jesus." In this hymn the inclusion of a final doxology (a Trinitarian formula of praise) appears for the first time in a Latin hymn.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Lo, how a rose e'er blooming

German anonymous

This much translated Twelfth Night German hymn was current at the time of Luther and first appeared in a Cologne Catholic hymnal. It combines themes of the root of Jesse, the prophesy of Isaiah, the Virgin mother Mary, and Christ as the rose dispelling darkness and death. The traditional melody, with its subtleties of rhythm, is usually sung to the famous harmonization by Michael Praetorius.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Savior of the nations, come

St. Ambrose, 340-397

The bishop of Milan is known as the father of Latin hymnody. His hymn rings the keynote for Advent, with the seven stanzas providing opportunity to proclaim God's purpose in sending the Messiah and our response to this Good News. Martin Luther's German translation, "Nun komm, der heiden Heiland," was put into English by William M. Reynolds, son of a captain in the Revolutionary War.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

MUSIC NOTES

The chorale prelude on "Savior of the nations, come" written by German baroque composer Johann Sebastian Bach is based on the hymn tune NUN KOMM DER HEIDEN HEILAND. This hymn was sung in Leipzig on all four Sundays in Advent and Bach used the tune in eight different chorale preludes and for three cantatas. In the Great Eighteen Chorales, Bach has three settings, the first of which he puts the melody in the soprano. Yet it is thoroughly disguised through elaborate ornamentation. The mood is ethereal and tranquil, with a deep sense of mysticism. The meditative mood perhaps is a reminder that Christ was born to save humanity.

Maria walks amid the thorn is a sixteenth-century hymn traditionally sung in anticipation of Christmas during the Advent season. Although the melody is considered to be much older, its first appearances of lyrics and music together is the Gesangbuch of Andernach (1608) which claims that it was popular at the time. Translated into English in the 1950s by Henry S. Drinker, the lyrics and hymn tune were written by that prolific writer/composer "Anonymous" and given the German title Maria durch ein'n Dornwald ging (literally "Mary through a thorn-wood goes"). The lyrics combine the Greek text of the "Kyrie eleison" from the Ordinary of the Mass with a vernacular text (originally German, translated into English) that both tells of Mary's pregnancy and her role as mother of Jesus, with the association of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the "spotless Rose"—a traditional image in German Christian hymnody. In this arrangement, German composer Hugo Distler set the tune and text for three voices.

Andrew Carter (born 1939) is a prolific English composer of choral and organ music, as well as an active choral conductor. For many years a member of the Choir at York Minster, while also conducting his own ensemble, the Chapter House Choir, and other groups, he has become renowned for his finely crafted works. The Toccata on Veni, Emmanuel is a brilliant and bright setting of the familiar Advent hymn. The melody is heard in the pedals under fiery figurations in the hands.
