

WORD

FIRST READING Exodus 34:29-35

Moses' face shone with the reflected glory of God after he received the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai. The sight caused the Israelites to be afraid, so Moses wore a veil to mask the radiance of God's glory, taking it off when he spoke directly with God.

Moses came down from Mount Sinai. As he came down from the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hand, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, the skin of his face was shining, and they were afraid to come near him. But Moses called to them; and Aaron and all the leaders of the congregation returned to him, and Moses spoke with them. Afterward all the Israelites came near, and he gave them in commandment all that the Lord had spoken with him on Mount Sinai. When Moses had finished speaking with them, he put a veil on his face; but whenever Moses went in before the Lord to speak with him, he would take the veil off, until he came out; and when he came out, and told the Israelites what he had been commanded, the Israelites would see the face of Moses, that the skin of his face was shining; and Moses would put the veil on his face again, until he went in to speak with him.

SECOND READING 2 Corinthians 3:12--4:2

In his debates with the Corinthians, Paul contrasts the glory of Moses with the glory of Christ. The Israelites could not see Moses' face because of the veil. But in Christ we see the unveiled glory of God and are transformed into Christ's likeness.

Since, then, we have such a hope, we act with great boldness, not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the end of the glory that was being set aside. But their minds were hardened. Indeed, to this very day, when they hear the reading of the old covenant, that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside. Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds; but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed. Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit.

Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practice cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God.

The Holy Gospel according to Saint Luke, the ninth chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord.

The conversation about Jesus' suffering and death is enclosed in a dazzling foreshadowing of the resurrection. God affirms Jesus' identity, the disciples are stunned speechless, and Jesus resumes his mission with a demonstration of his power over evil.

Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah"—not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

On the next day, when they had come down from the mountain, a great crowd met him. Just then a man from the crowd shouted, "Teacher, I beg you to look at my son; he is my only child. Suddenly a spirit seizes him, and all at once he shrieks. It convulses him until he foams at the mouth; it mauls him and will scarcely leave him. I begged your disciples to cast it out, but they could not." Jesus answered, "You faithless and perverse generation, how much longer must I be with you and bear with you? Bring your son here." While he was coming, the demon dashed him to the ground in convulsions. But Jesus rebuked the unclean spirit, healed the boy, and gave him back to his father. And all were astounded at the greatness of God.

Upcoming Commemorations

George Herbert, hymnwriter, died 1633 *Tuesday, March 1, 2022*

An excellent scholar, Herbert served briefly in the English parliament, then became a parish priest. He was known for devoted care of his parishioners, as well as for writing poetry and hymns, including "Come, my way, my truth, my life." He died at age 40.

John Wesley, died 1791; Charles Wesley, died 1788; renewers of the church *Wednesday, March 2, 2022*

These brothers led a revival originally intended to remain within the Church of England, one that involved frequent communion and advocacy for the poor. Except for a brief time in America, they worked in England. Charles was also a prolific hymn writer. After their deaths, their work led to the formation of the Methodist Church.

HYMN NOTES

Love Divine, all loves excelling

Charles Wesley, 1707-1788

The idea for the hymn was taken from a popular song by the poet Dryden, "Fairest isle, all isles excelling." Its them is the great thread of divine love which runs through all of Wesley's hymns. After a prayer addressed to Christ to dwell within our lives, the hymn turns to the theme of sanctification—God's "great salvation" is sufficient to deliver a Christian from the power as well as from the guilt of sin (2 Corinthians 5:17). Thus we are "going on to perfection," being "changed from glory into glory" (2 Corinthians 3:18).—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Jesus, take us to the mountain

Jaroslav J. Vajda, 1919-2008

Born of Czechoslovakian parents, Vajda was educated at Concordia College in Fort Wayne, Indiana, and Concordia Theological Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri. Ordained as a Lutheran pastor in 1944, he served congregations in Pennsylvania and Indiana until 1963. He was editor of the periodicals The Lutheran Beacon (1959-1963) and This Day (1963-1971) and book editor and developer for Concordia Publishing House in St. Louis from 1971 until his retirement in 1986. The hymn tune SILVER SPRING was written by celebrated composer Carl Schalk in 1990 for the 50th anniversary of Saint Luke.

Beautiful savior

How often a simple work which no one felt was worth claiming has become an all time favorite. The choir director at St. Thomas' Church in Leipzig (Bach's famous church) discovered the Silesian tune, and Richard Willis (who also wrote the tune for "It came upon the midnight clear") introduced it to America. Oh wondrous image, vision fair

Here is a Latin text for Transfiguration from the fifteen-century Sarum Breviary, translated by John Mason Neale. His original in the Hymnal Noted, Part 2 began, "A type of those bright rays on high," with six stanzas. *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* prints a substantially altered version with the second and third stanza elided, maintaining nonetheless the brightness of the transfigured Christ and the connection with Moses and Elijah.—Hymnal Companion to ELW

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude: Chorale Prelude on "Schönster Herr Jesu" - Gerre Hancock (1934-2012)

Gerre Hancock served as Organist at Second Baptist Church in Lubbock, Texas; Assistant Organist at Saint Bartholomew's Episcopal Church, New York; Organist and Choirmaster at Christ Church (now Christ Church Cathedral) in Cincinnati, Ohio; and Organist and Master of the Choristers at Saint Thomas Church Fifth Avenue in New York City from 1971 to 2004. He was highly respected as one of America's greatest improvisers at the organ. This piece was written "for the Rev. Robert Scoggin and the Fellowship of United Methodist Musicians." It is two simple renderings of the tune with introduction, interlude and coda. While envisioned for a large and colorful organ, the basic musical integrity of the piece is such that it works remarkably well on smaller instruments.

Anthem: O Paschal Lamp of Radiant Light—Sam Batt Owens (1928-1998)

Sam Batt Owens enjoyed a long career as a well-known organist, composer, and church musician. Owens was born in Ashland, Ala., in 1928. He received a B. Mus. in organ performance, from the Birmingham Conservatory of Music, a M. Mus. in organ performance and composition from Birmingham- Southern College, and a D.M.A. in organ performance and musicology from Peabody College of Vanderbilt University. He was President of the Association of Anglican Musicians from 1989-1991 and established the AAM Placement Office. He was the receipient of numerous awards.

Postlude: Grand Plein Jeu on "Deo Gracias" - Mary Beth Bennett (b. 1954)

This setting of the hymn tune DEO GRACIAS is written in a French classical style with a four-voiced full plenum played in the hands. The hymn tune is played on Trumpet sounds in the feet (pedal).
