



Isaiah 43:16-21



SECOND READING

Philippians 3:4b-14


Writing to Christians in Philippi, Paul admits that his heritage and reputation could give him more reason than most people to place confidence in his spiritual pedigree. But the overwhelming grace of God in Jesus calls Paul to a new set of values.

[Paul writes:] If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

GOSPEL

John 12:1-8

The Holy Gospel according to Saint John, the twelfth chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

Judas willfully misinterprets as waste Mary's extravagant act of anointing Jesus' feet with costly perfume. Jesus recognizes that her lavish gift is both an expression of love and an anticipation of his burial.

Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."




APOSTLES' CREED

Upcoming Commemorations

Benedict the African, confessor, died 1589 Monday, April 4, 2022

Born into slavery on the island of Sicily, Benedict lived as a hermit until the pope ordered all hermits to attach themselves to a monastery, at which time Benedict joined the Franciscans. Though illiterate, he was highly respected as a confessor and later superior of his community.

Albrecht Dürer, died 1528; Matthias Grünewald, died 1529; Lucas Cranach, died 1553; artists

Wednesday, April 6, 2022

These great artists revealed through their work the mystery of salvation and the wonder of creation. Dürer's work reflected the apocalyptic spirit of his time. Though he remained a Roman Catholic, he was sympathetic to Martin Luther's reforming work. Grünewald's paintings are known for their dramatic forms, vivid colors, and depiction of light. Cranach's work includes many fine religious examples and several portraits of Martin Luther. Cranach was also widely known for his woodcuts.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, theologian, died 1945 Saturday, April 9, 2022

Bonhoeffer was a German theologian who wrote profoundly, yet in an accessible manner. In the Second World War, he became a leader of the Confessing Church in Germany that resisted the Nazi movement. Linked to a plot to kill Hitler, he was hanged shortly before the end of the war.

HYMN NOTES

In the cross of Christ I glory

John Bowring, 1792-1872

The theme was suggested by Galatians 6:114 ("but God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ."). The author, a Unitarian, claimed to know 200 languages and to speak 100. At one time he was Governor of Hong Kong. History is littered with civilizations and empires which have risen and fallen, but the cross has outlived them all. The cross also has deep meaning for us personally, giving us peace and joy in times of crises and disappointments.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

When I survey the wondrous cross

Isaac Watts, 1674-1748

More than one hymnologist has called this the finest hymn in the English language. It was included in Watts' hymns "for the Holy Ordinance of the Lord's Supper," but its theme is larger than the sacrament. Our gaze is fixed entirely on the cross, but stanza two (based on Galatians 6:14) warns us not to glory in ourselves. In stanza three we see the unveiling of the heart of God, filled with sorrow and love for us. A fourth stanza, unfortunately usually omitted, is startling: "His dying crimson like robe." When we feel something of the horror of the crucifixion, we are confronted with the demand of the cross: "my soul, my life, my all.".—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Jesus, the very thought of you

Attr. to Bernard of Clairvaux, 1091-1153

From 43 stanzas, two Communion hymns have been extracted—this and "Jesus thou joy of loving hearts." It was customary to write long meditations for use during the Sacrament or for seasons of penitence. The words are passionately addressed to Jesus, reflecting an intensity of devotion which is all too rare today.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Christ, the life of all the living

Ernst Christoph Homburg, 1605-1681

Homburg wrote this hymn about Christ suffering on our behalf and our "thousand, thousand thanks." It was published with eight stanzas in the first part of Homburg's *Geistliche Lieder*. Catherine Winkworth translated it with five stanzas in *The Chorale Book for England* in 1863. Homburg wrote secular poetry, including love songs and drinking songs. He found comfort in the word of God in response to personal troubles and wrote 150 hymns for his personal devotional use at home.—ELW Hymnal Companion

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude and Postlude: Reflection on "In the Cross of Christ I Glory" & "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" - Robert Hebble (1934-2020)

American organist and composer Robert Hebble was a graduate of Yale University and the Juilliard School, where he studied with Vittorio Giannini and Roger Sessions. He also spent a year in Paris in private study with Nadia Boulanger.

For over thirty years, Hebble's career was closely linked with the famed organist Virgil Fox. Fox was one of the first to recognize Hebble's creative gifts, appointing Hebble as his assistant at New York's Riverside Church at the age of sixteen. Hebble traveled extensively as an organist, pianist, composer, and clinician throughout the United States, Canada, and Asia.

His two reflections on two of today's hymns offer contemplative, creative pieces inspired by two well-know hymn tunes.

Choral Anthem: Drop, drop slow tears—Orlando Gibbons (1583-1625), arr. David Blackwell (b. 1961)

Gibbons was an English composer and keyboard player who was one of the last masters of the English Virginalist School and English Madrigal School. The best known member of a musical family dynasty, by the 1610s he was the leading composer and organist in England, with a career cut short by his sudden death in 1625 This hymn was written in the last few years of Gibbons' life, and is one of his most famous and beloved works. Its moving text is by the English poet Phineas Fletcher. Like Gibbons, he studied at King's College, Cambridge, and left a very sizeable output, including prose, epics, dramas, lyrics, epistles, psalms and hymns. This particular text is thoroughly mournful, expressing the deep grief of seeing Christ upon the cross.

Chorale Prelude on "Christ, the Life of All the Living" - Johann Ludwig Krebs (1713-1780)

Krebs, a student of J.S. Bach, continued to write in the forms that his teacher perfected. This setting of the chorale "Jesu, Meine Lebens Leben" features the chorale melody in long notes played in the right hand accompanied with foundation stops (usually principals and flutes) in the left hand and pedal.
