

FIRST READING Acts 9:1-6 [7-20]

Saul (later called Paul) was an ardent persecutor of all who followed the Way of Christ. This reading recounts the story of his transformation beginning with an encounter with Jesus Christ on the way to Damascus.

Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The reply came, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." [The men who were traveling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, "Ananias." He answered, "Here I am, Lord." The Lord said to him, "Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight." But Ananias answered, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name." But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name." So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, and after taking some food, he regained his strength.


For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, 20and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, "He is the Son of God."



GOSPEL John 21:1-19

The holy gospel according to Saint John, the twenty-first chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord.

The risen Christ appears again to his disciples by the sea where they were first called. After echoes of the fishing and feeding miracles, he gives a final reminder of the cost of a disciple's love and obedience.

After [he appeared to his followers in Jerusalem,] Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, you have no fish, have you?" They answered him, "No." He said to them, "Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the sea. But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off.

When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" because they knew it was the Lord. Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." A second time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep." He said to him the third time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go." (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, "Follow me."







Bread of Life from Heaven





Philip and James, Apostles

Sunday, May 1, 2022

Philip was one of the first disciples of Jesus, and called Nathanael to "come and see." He later responded to an Ethiopian official's request for teaching and baptism. Little is known of James, the son of Alphaeus, called "the Less" to distinguish him from another apostle named James.

Athanasius, Bishop of Alexandria, died 373

Monday, May 2, 2022

Best remembered for defending the teaching that Christ was fully God against those who taught otherwise, Athanasius was an influential church leader around the time of the Council of Nicea. He was banished from Alexandria five times for his forthright views.

Monica, mother of Augustine, died 387

Wednesday, May 4, 2022

Monica was married to a pagan husband who was ill-tempered and unfaithful, but whom she helped bring into the Christian faith. She repeated the influence on her son Augustine, who went on to become one of the greatest church teachers.

HYMN NOTES

Christ the Lord Is Risen Today!

Charles Wesley, 1707-1788

Wesley's original hymn had eleven stanzas. ELW uses 1-4, 10, and 11. The themes of Easter are struck: joy in heaven and earth, love's work finished, the battle won, the bursting of hell's gates, and the sting of death removed. The text was paired with a French tune usually associated with a mystery play about the donkey that took Mary to Bethlehem and Mary and Jesus to Egypt, celebrated on the Feast of the Circumcision, January 1. - ELW Hymnal Companion

Blessing and Honor

Horatius Bonar, 1808-1889

Bonar, a dedicated and successful minister in the Church of Scotland, wrote voluminously—nearly one book a year—including some 600 hymns. By piling up words (blessing-honor-glory-power; the kingdom, the crown, and the throne; the robe and the harp and the psalm) he imitates successfully a poetic device used by Isaac Watts. Its ringing praise echoes the high flown language of many passages from Revelation.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Bread of Life from Heaven

Susan Briehl, b. 1952

Briehl and Haugen had created a set of bilingual Eucharistic acclamations utilizing what Haugen calls "the utmost archetypal melody" of the ARGENTINE SANTO. "When the acclamations were first introduced for a gathering of Lutheran bishops' assistants in San Antonio, Texas, in 2001, [they] thought about adding a communion hymn." Briehl saw the "rich possibility" of John 6 and created the five stanzas given here.—ELW Hymnal Companion

This Joyful Eastertide

George Ratcliffe Woodward, 1848-1934

The author, a gifted translator of Latin, Greek and German hymns, edited a number of collections of carols including folk tunes from many world sources. The Dutch tune VRUECHTEN was a popular 17th century Dutch song, and for it Woodward provided his original words which have become increasingly popular. Fred Pratt Green, retired British Methodist minister, has also provided a different text for the tune, but beginning with the same first line.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Prelude & Postlude: Prelude, Air, Recessional—Robert Cundick (1926-2016)

Robert Cundick is perhaps best known for his 26 years as Mormon Tabernacle organist on Temple Square. A prolific composer in choral, orchestral, and chamber genres, his recent compositions include To Utah, for chorus and orchestra, and the Double Concerto for Piano, Cello, and Orchestra in D Minor. Dr. Cundick studied with composer Leroy Robertson and in 1953 received his PhD and began teaching at the University of Utah. He later taught at Brig-ham Young University for 24 years. As Tabernacle organist emeritus, he now devotes uninterrupted time to composing.—byumusicgroup.byu.edu

The Prelude, Air, Recessional was commissioned for a publishing series *Music for a Sunday Morning* from Concordia Publishing House started by Dr. Paul Bunjes who taught at Concordia Teachers College, River Forest, Ill. The aim of the series was to provide musical essays under the concept of a three-movement form that would be suitable for a prelude, voluntary, and postlude.

Choral Anthem: Thy Perfect Love—John Rutter (b. 1945)

Sunday, June 2 — London-born John Rutter (b. 1945) has written a large body of sacred music: anthems, carols, a Requiem and other choral works, as well as orchestral and other secular music. He has also has made significant contributions as an arranger and editor. Rutter studied at Cambridge and stayed on to found The Cambridge Singers in 1981. He still conducts this ensemble, which records on its own label, Collegium. For his services to music, Rutter was awarded a Lambeth Doctorate of Music by the Archbishop of Canterbury in 1996, and a CBE (Commander of the Order of the British Empire) in the Queen's New Year Honours List in 2007.

Some "hoity-toity musical gurus" and avant-garde composers have not considered Rutter to be a serious composer, because his music is too tuneful; but how many people listen to the music of Pierre Boulez? Rutter's anthem, *Thy Perfect Love*, is set to a text which dates from the 15th century.
