FIRST READING
Proverbs 8:1-4, 22-31

In the Bible, wisdom is portrayed in terms sometimes human and sometimes divine. Often, wisdom is personified as feminine. In this passage, Woman Wisdom is depicted not only as the first creation of God, but also as God's helper, rejoicing in God's creation, especially in human beings.

Does not wisdom call, and does not understanding raise her voice? On the heights, beside the way, at the crossroads she takes her stand; beside the gates in front of the town, at the entrance of the portals she cries out: "To you, O people, I call, and my cry is to all that live.

The Lord created me at the beginning of his work, the first of his acts of long ago. Ages ago I was set up, at the first, before the beginning of the earth. When there were no depths I was brought forth, when there were no springs abounding with water. Before the mountains had been shaped, before the hills, I was brought forth—when he had not yet made earth and fields, or the world's first bits of soil. When he established the heavens, I was there, when he drew a circle on the face of the deep, when he made firm the skies above, when he established the fountains of the deep, when he assigned to the sea its limit, so that the waters might not transgress his command, when he marked out the foundations of the earth, then I was beside him, like a master worker; and I was daily his delight, rejoicing before him always, rejoicing in his inhabited world and delighting in the human race."



Father Most Holy





Upcoming Commemorations

Basil the Great, Bishop of Caesarea, died 379; Gregory, Bishop of Nyssa, died around 385; Gregory of Nazianzus, Bishop of Constantinople, died around 389; Macrina, teacher, died around 379

Tuesday, June 14, 2022

The Cappadocian fathers, as the three men in this group are known, explored the mystery of the Holy Trinity. Basil's monastic rule forms the basis for Eastern monastic life. Gregory of Nazianzus defended orthodox Christianity in Constantinople. Gregory of Nyssa, Basil's younger brother, wrote on the spiritual life. Macrina, older sister of Basil and Gregory of Nyssa, was the leader of a community dedicated to asceticism, meditation, and prayer.

Emanuel Nine, martyrs, died 2015

Friday, June 17, 2022

On June 17, 2015, Clementa C. Pinckney, Cynthia Marie Graham Hurd, Susie Jackson, Ethel Lee Lance, DePayne Middleton-Doctor, Tywanza Sanders, Daniel Lee Simmons, Sharonda Coleman-Singleton, and Myra Thompson were murdered by a self-professed white supremacist while they were gathered for Bible study and prayer at the Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church (often referred to as Mother Emanuel) in Charleston, South Carolina. Pastors Pinckney and Simmons were both graduates of the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. A resolution to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance for the martyrdom of the Emanuel Nine was adopted by the Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America on August 8, 2019. Congregations of the ELCA are encouraged reaffirm their commitment to repenting of the sins of racism and white supremacy which continue to plague this church, to venerate the martyrdom of the Emanuel Nine, and to mark this day of penitence with study and prayer.

HYMN NOTES

Holy, holy, holy! Lord God almighty

Reginald Hever, 1783-1826

In spite of a very limited rhyme scheme (the "ee" vowel), irregular accent, and uneven numbers of syllables in the various lines, this hymn based on John's vision of God enthroned in heavenly glory as found in Revelation 4 is a very popular hymn. The use of the angels' song (Holy, holy, holy) is pure adoration of God in his "wholly-otherness." Although filled with apocalyptic language, the hymn combines a sense of mystery with God's mercy, power, love and purity.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

I bind unto myself today

Attr. St. Patrick, c. 372-466

In baptism, God by the Spirit in the Trinitarian name enters, shakes the church of God, and grafts us into Christ's body. In this hymn the church responds by binding to itself the strong name of the Trinity—acknowledging and laying hold of the binding that God has already accomplished. Then it tells the story of what God has done in Christ, of the creation to which the church also binds itself as God does, and of Christ's presence within, behind, before, beside, above, in quiet and danger, in mouth of friend and stranger—to win, comfort, and restore. While "St. Patrick's Breastplate" is a striding tune, "Deirdre" used for the fourth stanza, has more stasis, is more meditative and introspective, a good fit for quietly celebrating Christ's presence rather than narrating it.—ELW Hymnal Companion

Father most holy, merciful, and tender

Latin, 10th century

Three translations have been made of this Sapphic ode text by A.E. Alston, R.A. Knox, and Percy Dearmer. Two have appeared in Anglican hymnals, and the other in the Catholic *Westminster Hymnal* (1940). The theme is Trinitarian, and phrases of praise and adoration from many sources are borrowed to create a rich tapestry of praise.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Immortal, Invisible, God only wise

Walter Chalmers Smith. 1824-1908

"Now unto the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only wise God, be honor and glory forever and ever" (I Timothy 1:17) is the basis for this hymn of pure praise. The rollicking anapestic rhythm of the Welsh melody rushes the singer along to the climactic poetic thought of God being invisible only because He is hidden by the splendor of light.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude and Postlude: Prelude and Fugue in E-flat Major, BWV 552—Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

In 1739, J.S. Bach published the Clavier-Übung III, a monumental collection of liturgical organ works which is sometimes called the German Organ Mass. The compilation begins and ends with two mighty musical pillars which have been catalogued as the Prelude and Fugue in E-flat Major, BWV 552. The latter has been nicknamed the "St. Anne" Fugue because its subject is strikingly similar to William Croft's English hymn of the same name.

The Clavier-Übung III is filled with references to Christian numerology, especially to the Trinity. The Prelude, set in a key with three flats, is made up of three themes. The first, containing the majestic dotted rhythms of a French overture, may represent the Father. The second theme, representing the Son, is quieter with a graceful galant statement, followed by an echo. This section has been compared to an Italian concerto. The final theme, representing the Holy Ghost, is filled with fugal counterpoint with rapidly moving eighth notes "descending, flickering like tongues of fire." As the Prelude unfolds, the themes overlap, suggesting a cosmic sense of unity.

In his 1905 book, Jean-Sebastien Bach, le musicien-poête, Albert Schweitzer wrote,

The triple fugue ... is a symbol of the Trinity. The same theme recurs in three connected fugues, but each time with another personality. The first fugue is calm and majestic, with an absolutely uniform movement throughout; in the second the theme seems to be disguised, and is only occasionally recognisable in its true shape, as if to suggest the divine assumption of an earthly form; in the third, it is transformed into rushing semiquavers as if the Pentacostal wind were coming roaring from heaven.

Emerging over the eternal foundation of the "St. Anne" subject, the dance-like third subject evokes a lightness of spirit. In the final, euphoric moments, these elements combine into a joyful, celestial celebration.—Timothy Judd

Choral Anthem: O Trinity, most blessed light—C. Kenneth Turner (1907-1977)

Charles Turner was an English composer and part-time spy, who took the last recorded British pre-World War II photographs of Adolf Hitler. His anthem on the text attributed to St. Ambrose starts quietly. It ends with jubilation over the words forever praising God.
