





FIRST READING 1 Kings 19:15-16, 19-21 In the story preceding today's reading, the prophet Elijah flees for his life to the security of God's mountain. There God reveals to Elijah that there are still other faithful people in Israel and commissions him to anoint new leaders, including his own successor, Elisha.

Then the Lord said to [Elijah,] "Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus; when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael as king over Aram. Also you shall anoint Jehu son of Nimshi as king over Israel; and you shall anoint Elisha son of Shaphat of Abel-meholah as prophet in your place.

So he set out from there, and found Elisha son of Shaphat, who was plowing. There were twelve yoke of oxen ahead of him, and he was with the twelfth. Elijah passed by him and threw his mantle over him. He left the oxen, ran after Elijah, and said, "Let me kiss my father and my mother, and then I will follow you." Then Elijah said to him, "Go back again; for what have I done to you?" He returned from following him, took the yoke of oxen, and slaughtered them; using the equipment from the oxen, he boiled their flesh, and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he set out and followed Elijah, and became his servant.

SECOND READING

For Paul, the freedom Christ gives is not permission to do whatever we want. It is the invitation to be what we could not be otherwise. The power and guidance of Christ's Holy Spirit produce a different kind of life, one marked by the fruit of this Holy Spirit.

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.


For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for selfindulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.




Let us pray.


COMMUNION

When giving the bread and cup, the communion ministers say: The body of Christ, given for you. The blood of Christ, shed for you.



Lord, Take My Hand and Lead Me





Upcoming Commemorations

Cyril, Bishop of Alexandria, died 444

Monday, June 27, 2022

Cyril defended the orthodox teachings about the person of Christ. After a conflict involving all of the major Christian leaders of the time, it was decided that Cyril's interpretation, that Christ's person included both divine and human natures, was correct.

Irenaeus, Bishop of Lyons, died around 202

Tuesday, June 28, 2022

This important early church leader tried very hard to hold to the faith handed down by the apostles. An opponent of the movement known as gnosticism, Irenaeus was one of the first to speak of the church as catholic, or linked together.

Peter and Paul, Apostles

Wednesday, June 29, 2022

These two strong-willed apostles are the pillars of the church in the first generation after Christ. Peter was one of the Twelve, one who both offered a glorious confession of faith and later denied knowing Jesus. Paul once led the persecution of Christians, then was converted and helped bring the faith to non-Jewish people.

Catherine Winkworth, died 1878; John Mason Neale, died 1866; hymn translators

Friday, July 1, 2022

Neale was an English priest who specialized in the translation of Latin and Greek hymns into English. Winkworth lived in Manchester, England, and devoted herself to translating German hymns. Almost all English-speaking hymnals include many of their translations.

HYMN NOTES

O Jesus, I have promised

John Ernest Bode, 116-1874

Based on Luke 9:57, "Lord, I will follow thee withersoever thou goest," the hymn was written by the author for the confirmation of his three children. But it says much more and is a prayer for Christ's presence at all times—in the struggle against sin, in the midst of the world's temptations, and the struggles with the "storms of passion." Jesus has promised us to be with him in glory, but we must also promise to follow and serve him to the end.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Lead Me, Guide Me

Doris Akers, 1922-1995

Akers wrote this text and its music in 1953 in Oakland, California. The hymn is an African American gospel counterpart of the chorale tradition's "If you but trust in God to guide you." This hymn appears on the surface to be more personal—and it surely doest not lack that quality, but the first person singular of the African American tradition is profoundly communal—ELW Hymnal Companion

Lord, Take My Hand and Lead Me

Julie von Hausmann, 1826-1901

This version of this hymn in our hymnal combines two English translations of the original hymn written in German. The author worked with the poor and wrote poetry, sometimes conceiving poems while she was awake at night with migraines and then writing them down in the morning. This hymn was extensively used for confirmations in some American German congregations with a Lutheran heritage, especially on Palm Sunday in the Evangelical Synod of North America.—ELW Hymnal Companion

Lead on, O King eternal

Ernest W. Shurtleff, 1862-1917

For his graduation from Andover Theological Seminary in 1887, Shurtleff was asked by his classmates to write an appropriate hymn. Graduation is never an end—merely a road marker on the path of life. SO the hymn is an appropriate call for us to be prepared to pitch our tents and to follow wherever God leads. The rousing marching tune by the self taught English organist and composer, Henry Smart, adds to the excitement of the call to march.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude : Setting on "O Jesus, I Have Promised" - Aaron David Miller (b. 1972)

Miller's arrangement of the hymn tune "Munich" starts with a quiet free-flowing melody accompanied by the string sounds of the organ. The melody proper is played in the feet accompanied by the strings while the introductory melody is superimposed on top. A brief section featuring imitation between two voices serves as bridge to the next full statement of the melody, this time played in the left hand. Again the introductory free-flowing melody is played on top of the melody. The piece ends with the original material in a quiet manner.

Postlude: Festival Postlude on "Lancashire" - Charles Callahan (b. 1951)

This arrangement of the hymn tune "Lancashire" starts with a fanfare followed by a harmonized statement of the melody. The fanfare material comes back before another statement of the melody this time played in the left hand. The piece ends with the opening fanfare material.
