

WORD

FIRST READING Isaiah 66:10-14

Those who returned from the exile found that the hopes for the glorious restoration of Judah were not completely fulfilled. For these disappointed people, the prophet envisions salvation in the image of a nursing woman. Mother Jerusalem and a mothering God remind the community how they are sustained and supported.

Rejoice with Jerusalem, and be glad for her, all you who love her; rejoice with her in joy, all you who mourn over her—that you may nurse and be satisfied from her consoling breast; that you may drink deeply with delight from her glorious bosom.

For thus says the Lord:
I will extend prosperity to her like a river,
and the wealth of the nations like an overflowing stream;

you shall be comforted in Jerusalem.



SECOND READING

Galatians 6:[1-6] 7-16

In the close of his letter to the Galatians, Paul encourages them to live as people made right with God through faith in Jesus Christ. Here Paul offers practical advice about how believers exercise common concern for one other in "the family of faith."

[My friends, if anyone is detected in a transgression, you who have received the Spirit should restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness. Take care that you yourselves are not tempted. Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ. For if those who are nothing think they are something, they deceive themselves. All must test their own work; then that work, rather than their neighbor's work, will become a cause for pride. 5For all must carry their own loads. Those who are taught the word must share in all good things with their teacher.]


Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith.

See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised—only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything; but a new creation is everything! As for those who will follow this rule—peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

GOSPEL Luke 10:1-11, 16-20

The holy gospel according to Saint Luke, the tenth chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus commissions harvesters and laborers to go where he would go and do what he would do. Risking hardship and danger in exchange for the experience of great joy, they offer peace and healing as signs that the reign of God is near.

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house!' And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the laborer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, 'Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near.'"

"Whoever listens to you listens to me, and whoever rejects you rejects me, and whoever rejects the one who sent me."

The seventy returned with joy, saying, "Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!" He said to them, "I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightning. See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing will hurt you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven."



Benedict of Nursia, Abbot of Monte Cassino, died around 540

Monday, July 11, 2022

Benedict is known as the father of the Western monastic movement. Educated in Rome, he went to live as a hermit, and eventually gathered a community of monks around him. He wrote a rule for living in monasteries that is used by Benedictines and adapted by others.

Nathan Söderblom, Bishop of Uppsala, died 1931

Tuesday, July 12, 2022

A winner of the Nobel Prize for peace for his efforts to unite peoples after the First World War, Söderblom also called attention to the revival of early church worship principles, and helped to lay the groundwork for the World Council of Churches.

HYMN NOTES

Spread, Oh, Spread, Almighty Word

Jonathan F. Bahnmaier, 1774-1841

This hymn was written sometime before 1827, when it was printed separately. The next year it was included in *Kern des deutschen Liederschatzes* (Nuremberg, 1828), where it had seven stanzas. Catherine Winkworth translated it in her *Lyra Germanica* (1858). The translation in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* is from *Lutheran Book of Worship*, both print stanzas 1, 3, 4, and 7 of the original. The second half of the first stanza is altered to follow the German original.—ELW Hymnal Companion

We All Are One in Mission

Rusty Edwards, b. 1955

Edwards wrote this hymn in 1985 in response to a letter from the Lutheran bishop Paul Erickson that said, "Our mission is to touch the lives of others, with Christ's love." It was used in the 1986 mission appeal of the Lutheran Church in America, published in *The Lutheran Journal* (1986). —ELW Hymnal Companion

Blest Be the Tie That Binds

John Fawcett, 1740-1817

Fawcett, an English Baptist minister in Yorkshire, received a call to a bigger and more prestigious church in London. After preaching his farewell sermon and loading his luggage on the wagons, he decided that he would prefer to stay with his fellowship in the smaller church. In its first publication in 1782 it was titled "Brotherly Love." It is widely used as a closing prayer at many church gatherings.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

God of our fathers, whose almighty hand

Daniel C. Roberts, 1841-1907

Roberts' hymn was written at St. Thomas' Episcopal Church in Brandon, Vermont for the 100th birthday of America. The author served in the Civil War, and spent his years in ministry in small New England parishes. Warren's rousing tune with its trumpet fan-fares has helped to make this patriotic text a perennial favorite.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude: Six Variations on "National Hymn" - Margaret Sandresky (b. 1921)

The Six Variations on "National Hymn" was commissioned by Dr. Kimberly Marshall in celebration of the 60th anniversary of the founding of Knollwood Baptist Church, Winston-Salem, NC, and premiered by her on October 23, 2016. The theme is played first, and is followed by the six variations: a three-part canon, pastorale, a prayer, a two-part canon with the pedals, a Grand Jeux, and a toccata.

Communion: Jesu Meine Freude-J.S. Bach

Jesu, meine Freude (Jesus, my joy), BWV 227, is a motet by Johann Sebastian Bach. The longest and most musically complex of Bach's motets, it is set in eleven movements for up to five voices. It is named after the Lutheran hymn "Jesu, meine Freude" with words by Johann Franck, first published in 1653. The motet contains the six stanzas of the hymn in its odd-numbered movements. The hymn tune by Johann Crüger appears in all of these movements in different styles of chorale settings. The text of the motet's even-numbered movements is taken from the eighth chapter of the Epistle to the Romans, a passage that influenced key Lutheran teachings. The hymn, written in the first person with a focus on an emotional bond with Jesus, forms a contrasting expansion of the doctrinal biblical text. Bach set both texts alternating with and complementing each other, in a structure of symmetries on different layers.

Postlude: Hornpipe from Water Music—G.F. Handel (1685-1759)

The Water Music is a collection of orchestral movements, often published as three suites, composed by George Frideric Handel. It premiered on 17 July 1717, in response to King George I's request for a concert on the River Thames. Hornpipe is a lively triple meter dance rhythm that was popular in the English Isles. In it you will hear the trumpet and horn in dialogue (or an approximation of horn by using a combination of flute pipes)
