



FIRST READING

Deuteronomy 30:15-20

Moses speaks to the Israelites, who are about to enter the land promised to their ancestors. In this passage, he lays out the stark choice before them: choose life by loving and obeying the Lord; or choose death by following other gods.

See, I have set before you today life and prosperity, death and adversity. If you obey the commandments of the Lord your God that I am commanding you today, by loving the Lord your God, walking in his ways, and observing his commandments, decrees, and ordinances, then you shall live and become numerous, and the Lord your God will bless you in the land that you are entering to possess. But if your heart turns away and you do not hear, but are led astray to bow down to other gods and serve them, I declare to you today that you shall perish; you shall not live long in the land that you are crossing the Jordan to enter and possess. I call heaven and earth to witness against you today that I have set before you life and death, blessings and curses. Choose life so that you and your descendants may live, loving the Lord your God, obeying him, and holding fast to him; for that means life to you and length of days, so that you may live in the land that the Lord swore to give to your ancestors, to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob.

SECOND READING

While Paul was in prison, he was aided by Onesimus, a man who had run away from Philemon, a slaveowner and a Christian friend of Paul. Paul told Onesimus to return to Philemon and encouraged Philemon to receive Onesimus back as a Christian brother.

Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother,

To Philemon our dear friend and co-worker, to Apphia our sister, to Archippus our fellow soldier, and to the church in your house:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.


When I remember you in my prayers, I always thank my God because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith toward the Lord Jesus. I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we may do for Christ. I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother.

For this reason, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do your duty, yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love—and I, Paul, do this as an old man, and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and to me. I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might be of service to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel; but I preferred to do nothing without your consent, in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back forever, no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a beloved brother—especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord.

So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. If he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say.

GOSPEL

The holy gospel according to Saint Luke, the fourteenth chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

Jesus speaks frankly about the costs of discipleship. Those who follow him should know from the outset that completing the course of discipleship will finally mean renouncing all other allegiances.

Now large crowds were traveling with [Jesus;] and he turned and said to them, "Whoever comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, yes, and even life itself, cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple. For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it? Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him, saying, "This fellow began to build and was not able to finish.' Or what king, going out to wage war against another king, will not sit down first and consider whether he is able with ten thousand to oppose the one who comes against him with twenty thousand? If he cannot, then, while the other is still far away, he sends a delegation and asks for the terms of peace. So therefore, none of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions."

The gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**






Let us pray.


COMMUNION





HYMN NOTES

O God beyond All Praising

Michael Perry, 1942-1996

Perry wrote this hymn for the tune THAXTED to supply a text for worship rather than the one associated with it, "I vow to thee, my country." It first appeared in *Hymns for Today's Church* (1982) and is an expansive hymn of praise, as one might expect for an expansive tune such as this. It moves from God's mercies generally, to what God has done in Christ specifically, to our response in Christ.—ELW Hymnal Companion

Bread of Life from Heaven

Susan Briehl, b. 1952

Briehl and Haugen had created a set of bilingual Eucharistic acclamations utilizing what Haugen calls "the utmost archetypal melody" of the ARGENTINE SANTO. "When the acclamations were first introduced for a gathering of Lutheran bishops' assistants in San Antonio, Texas, in 2001, [they] thought about adding a communion hymn." Briehl saw the "rich possibility" of John 6 and created the five stanzas given here.—ELW Hymnal Companion

Earth and all stars

Herbert F. Brokering, b. 1926-2009

For the 90th anniversary of St. Olaf College in 1864, Brokering, a Lutheran minister and poet, wrote a text which attempts to pick up and praise "many facets fo life which merge in the life of the community. So there are references to buildings, nature, learning, family, war, festivity." We can enjoy this contemporary hymn because it brings pictures and visual images to mind as we sing.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude and Postlude: Suite du Premier Ton—Denis Bédard (b. 1950)

This suite, an evocation of French Baroque organ music, begins with a majestic *Plein Jeu*. This is followed by a lively and joyful *Dialogue* between the trumpet and the cornet, after which, in the *Récit*, a mournful melody is heard on the oboe. The *Grand Jeu* consists of a fugato in ternary rhythm surrounded by two sections indicated *Maestoso*.

Music during the offering: Largo and Courante from Sonata for Eb Alto Saxophone and Piano—Henri Eccles (1670-1742) Definite information is scant for Henry Eccles (1670-1742), except that he was an English violinist who spent a portion of his career in France. This sonata was written in France. One of this sonatas was arranged for alto saxophone by Sigurd M. Rascher.
