WORD

FIRST READING

Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4

Injustice and violence in the time leading up to the Babylonian exile move this prophet to lament: How can a good and all-powerful God see evil in the world and seemingly remain indifferent? God answers by proclaiming that the righteous will live by faith.

O Lord, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not listen? Or cry to you “Violence!” and you will not save? Why do you make me see wrongdoing and look at trouble? Destruction and violence are before me; strife and contention arise. So the law becomes slack and justice never prevails. The wicked surround the righteous—therefore judgment comes forth perverted.

I will stand at my watchpost, and station myself on the rampart; I will keep watch to see what he will say to me, and what he will answer concerning my complaint. Then the Lord answered me and said: Write the vision; make it plain on tablets, so that a runner may read it. For there is still a vision for the appointed time; it speaks of the end, and does not lie. If it seems to tarry, wait for it; it will surely come, it will not delay. Look at the proud! Their spirit is not right in them, but the righteous live by their faith.

Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

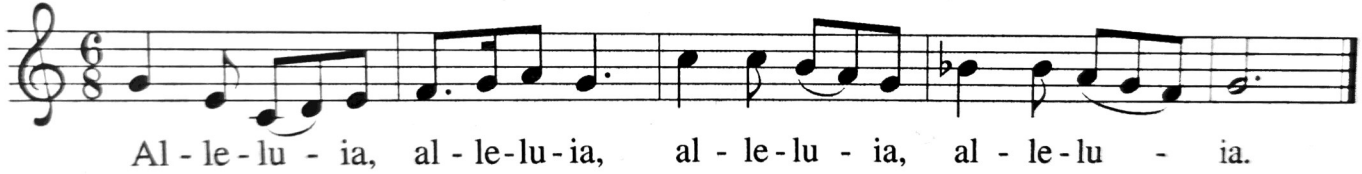
I am grateful to God—whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did—when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.

Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.





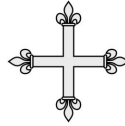

Upcoming Commemorations

Francis of Assisi, renewer of the church, died 1226

Tuesday, October 4, 2022

Born into the family of a wealthy merchant, Francis gave up his inheritance to serve poor people. He formed the Order of Friars Minor (called Franciscans), who took on poverty and the task of preaching "using words if necessary." Francis had a spirit of gratitude for all of God's creation.

Theodor Fliedner, renewer of society, died 1864

Tuesday, October 4, 2022

Fliedner helped to bring about a revival of the ministry of deaconesses among Lutherans. He was influenced in this by Moravian deaconesses he had met. The motherhouse he founded in Kaiserswerth, Germany, inspired many around the world to take up this ministry.

William Tyndale, translator, martyr, died 1536

Thursday, October 6, 2022

Tyndale was ordained a priest in England, and wished to translate the Bible into English. He was opposed in this by King Henry VIII, causing him to flee to Germany. He completed the New Testament in 1525, but before he could finish the Old Testament, he was tried for heresy and burned at the stake.

Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, pastor in North America, died 1787

Friday, October 7, 2022

Divided Lutherans in America asked leaders in Europe to send someone who could take charge and unite their work. Muhlenberg was sent, and was effective in organizing the American Lutherans. Among other accomplishments, his liturgical principles became the basis for the Common Service of 1888.

HYMN NOTES

When In Our Music God Is Glorified

Fred Pratt Green, 1903-2000

This hymn was written by the retired Methodist minister-hymnist for a Festival of Praise in 1972 to be sung to Stanford's tune ENGELBERG. No finer hymn has been written about the reasons for the use of music in worship, and it is reassuring to know that a new hymn can become immensely popular world-wide in a few short years while the author is still living. No hymnal editor would dare omit this hymn.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

O Master, Let Me Walk With You

Washington Gladden, 1836-1918

Gladden, one of America's best known Congregationalist ministers, was a powerful and fearless advocate of the "social gospel." The heart of this message is found in the first two lines, "O Master, let me walk with you, in lowly paths of service free" and the poem was entitled "Walking with God."—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

My God, How Wonderful Thou Art

Frederick Faber, 1814-1863

This hymn had originally nine stanzas. The framing theme of the hymn is a beatific vision. It contains the wonder that the God of such unfathomable brightness stoops to us in love and invites us to respond in love.—ELW Hymnal Companion

Faith of our Fathers

Frederick Faber

This is a hymn whose focus and meaning is completely different from the intention of the author. Faber sought to convert England to Catholicism with "Mary's prayers" and "faith of our fathers," but Unitarians altered it for Protestant use, and it is found in practically all American hymnals and sung with enthusiasm as singers vow to be true to the faith till death. God moves in mysterious ways! —Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude: Musings on "Engelberg" - Paul Leddington Wright (b. 1957)

Paul Leddington Wright was organ scholar at St. Catharine's College, Cambridge where he studied with Peter Le Huray, David Willcocks and Alan Ridout. On leaving Cambridge, he freelanced for four years working mainly in the professional theatre as a musical director.

His arrangement of the tune ENGELBERG starts quiet. As the piece modulates (changes keys) it becomes louder. When the original material comes back, it is played softly again. The coda features a quick crescendo (getting louder) and decrescendo (getting softer).

Choral Anthem : Thee We Adore—Frederick H. Candlyn (1892-1964)

Candlyn was an English-born organist, composer and choirmaster who spent most of his professional career at two Episcopal Church congregations in New York. Candlyn composed two hundred works, primarily anthems, cantatas, service settings and organ solos. Three of his anthems ("Christ, whose glory fills the skies," "Thee We Adore," and "King of Glory, King of Peace") remain part of the standard repertoire of Episcopal church choirs in North America.—Wikipedia

Thee We Adore is a choral anthem based on the plainsong hymn "Adoro Te Devote." Today's rendition features an oboist instead of the organ approximation of that sound.

Postlude: Chorale Prelude on "Engelberg" - Aaron David Miller (b. 1972)

Aaron David Miller is a renowned organ improviser having won numerous international awards and given concerts across the country. Dr. Miller is Music Director at House of Hope Presbyterian Church in St. Paul, MN. He is also a Forensic Musicologist for Donato Music, Scarsdale, NY.

His setting of the tune ENGELBERG starts with an opening fanfare. The tune proper is featured in the pedals followed by a return of the fanfare material. This leads to a dialogue of the tune between the right hand and pedals with frequent key changes. The opening material comes back and ends triumphantly.
