WORD

FIRST READING 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c

Naaman, a Syrian general, suffers from leprosy. In this passage Elisha miraculously cures his illness, but only after Naaman realizes, with the help of his servants, that he also needs healing for his pride. This foreign general then acknowledges the sovereignty of the God of Israel.

Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favor with his master, because by him the Lord had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from leprosy. Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, "If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy." When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, "Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me."

But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, "Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel." So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored and you shall be clean." But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, "I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the Lord his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure the leprosy! Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be clean?" He turned and went away in a rage. But his servants approached and said to him, "Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, 'Wash, and be clean'?" So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean.

Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company; he came and stood before him and said, "Now I know that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel."

SECOND READING 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Though Paul is chained as a prisoner, the word of God is never shackled or confined. Timothy is encouraged to proclaim that word of freedom in an honest and upright life as well as in his teaching and preaching.

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David—that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saving is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful—for he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."

HYMN NOTES

Praise, my soul, the King of heaven

Henry F. Lyte, 1793-1847

While earlier hymnodists made paraphrases of hymns, Lyte, who won the prize for poetry three years in a row at Trinity College, Dublin, added a new dimension by making them poetical interpretations. This version of Psalm 103 includes such memorable lines as "Ransome, healed, restored, forgiven," and "Father'like he tends and spares us." Unfortunately a stanza based on verses 15-17 beginning "Frail as summer's flower we flourish, Blows the wind, and it is gone" is usually omitted.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins.

Baptized in Water

Michael Saward, 1932-2015

Saward wrote this hymn in London on May 29, 1981. Each stanza begins with allusions to John 3:5 and Ephesians 1:13 and then, somewhat like "Wash, O God, our sons and daughters", runs out aspects of what God does in baptism—cleanses, makes us heirs of salvation, promises, brings death and life in Christ, frees, forgives, marks, and gives new life in the Spirit as God's children—so that in trust we thankfully and joyfully sing God's praise.—ELW Hymnal Companion

You Satisfy the Hungry Heart

Omer Westendorf, 1916-1997

Westerndorf wrote this hymn for the Forty-First International Eucharistic Congress, held in Philadelphia in 1976, with the theme "The hungers of the human family." With the tune BICENTENNIAL it was selected as the official hymn for the Congress from among two hundred entries. Like the sacrament it celebrates, it gathers many connections from a host of multiple images—hungry heart, finest wheat, saving Lord, bread of life, shepherd, sheep, family, rejoicing, praise, gratitude, blood of Christ outpoured, one cup, one loaf, one body, the mystery that Christ's presence cannot be contained in the world but dwells with us, God's giving to us, and our service to others.—ELW Hymnal Companion

Oh, Sing to the Lord

Gerhard Cartford, 1923-2016

In November 1982, Cartford and his wife went to a meeting of Brazilian Lutheran pastors in Itupuranga in Southern Brazil. The new hymnal *Hinos do Povo de Deus* (1981) they were using contained this hymn, and they sang it. Cartford says that "the song was well known in Brazil and sung frequently. I was strongly attracted to it, so when we got back to Buenos Airse, Argentina, where we were living then, I translated it from Portuguese to Spanish, and we began to sing it in Argentine Lutheran churches. Later, I translated it also to English, and introduced it in the U.S. when we were home on furlough." - ELW Hymnal Companion

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude: Hymn Improvisation on "Bunessan" - Michael Burkhardt (b. 1957)

Burkhardt is internationally known for his innovative and inspiring hymn festivals and for his creative work with children. He is in frequent demand as a choral clinician, organ recitalist, and hymn festival leader.

His setting of the hymn tune BUNESSAN, in an irregular meter, begins with a ritornello with arpeggio figuration. The first half of the tune is played in the tenor range in the left hand. This is followed by the ritornello. The second half of the tune is played again in the left hand. The piece finishes with the ritornello.

Choral Anthem: Now Thank We All Our God—J.S. Bach (1685-1750)

The chorale *Now Thank We All Our God* is taken from Bach's cantata "Gott der Herr ist Sonn und Schild" (God the Lord is sun and shield, Psalm 84:12). To celebrate the feast of the Reformation, this cantata was premiered on October 31, 1725. Originally scored for orchestra, today the organ is playing an adaptation. The chorale is sung by phrases with instrumental interludes.

Postlude: Oh, Sing to the Lord—Emma Lou Diemer (b. 1927)

Diemer is an American composer from Kansas City, Missouri. Diemer has written many works for orchestra, chamber ensemble, keyboard, voice, chorus, and electronic media. Diemer is a keyboard performer and over the years has given concerts of her own organ works at Washington National Cathedral, The Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels in Los Angeles, Grace Cathedral and St. Mary's Cathedral in San Francisco, and others.

Her interpretation of the hymn "Oh, Sing to the Lord" is an exploration of the tune with registration changes and harmonic twists. Emphasized is the dancing nature of the tune.
