WORD

FIRST READING Jeremiah 14:7-10, 19-22

In a time of drought, the people pray for mercy, repenting of their sins and the sins of their ancestors. They appeal to God to remember the covenant, to show forth God's power, and to heal their land by sending life-giving rain.

Although our iniquities testify against us, act, O Lord, for your name's sake; our apostasies indeed are many, and we have sinned against you. O hope of Israel, its savior in time of trouble, why should you be like a stranger in the land, like a traveler turning aside for the night? Why should you be like someone confused, like a mighty warrior who cannot give help? Yet you, O Lord, are in the midst of us, and we are called by your name; do not forsake us!

Thus says the Lord concerning this people: Truly they have loved to wander, they have not restrained their feet; therefore the Lord does not accept them, now he will remember their iniquity and punish their sins.

Have you completely rejected Judah? Does your heart loathe Zion? Why have you struck us down so that there is no healing for us? We look for peace, but find no good; for a time of healing, but there is terror instead. We acknowledge our wickedness, O Lord, the iniquity of our ancestors, for we have sinned against you. Do not spurn us, for your name's sake; do not dishonor your glorious throne; remember and do not break your covenant with us. Can any idols of the nations bring rain? Or can the heavens give showers? Is it not you, O Lord our God? We set our hope on you, for it is you who do all this.

SECOND READING 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18

The conclusion of this letter to a young minister offers a final perspective on life from one who faced death. Though others let him down, Paul was sure of his faith in the Lord, who stood by him and lent him strength.

As for me, I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

At my first defense no one came to my support, but all deserted me. May it not be counted against them! But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed and all the Gentiles might hear it. So I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and save me for his heavenly kingdom. To him be the glory forever and ever. Amen.

Upcoming Commemorations

James of Jerusalem, martyr, died around 62

Sunday, October 23, 2022

One of three early-church leaders named James, this man is identified in the New Testament and by a historian of the time as a brother of Jesus. Scholars are uncertain whether this means a blood brother. He was a leader of the church in Jerusalem.

Philipp Nicolai, died 1608; Johann Heermann, died 1647; Paul Gerhardt, died 1676; hymnwriters Wednesday, October 26, 2022

These great hymnwriters all worked in seventeenth-century Germany in times of war and plague. Nicolai, a pastor, lost 1,300 parishioners to plague, 170 in one week. He wrote "O Morning Star, how fair and bright" and "Wake, awake, for night is flying." Heermann's hymns, including "Ah, holy Jesus," often express the emotions of faith. Gerhardt, perhaps the greatest Lutheran hymnwriter, was a pastor in Berlin.

Simon and Jude, Apostles

Friday, October 28, 2022

We know little about these apostles. Simon is listed as "the zealot" or Cananean in New Testament lists. Jude, also called Thaddeus, asked Jesus at the last supper why he had revealed himself to the disciples but not to the world.

HYMN NOTES

Savior, When in Dust to You

Robert Grant, 1779-1838

The Christian Observer (November 1815) first printed this hymn under the title "Litany," which aptly describes it. Episcopalians in the United States used it before it was included in the posthumous Sacred Poems of the late Rt. Hon. R. Grant. Robert Grant was born in Bengal, India. In addition to hymns, he wrote A Sketch of the History of the East India Company. ELW Hymnal Companion

Founded On Faith

Paul Weber, b. 1949

This hymn by Lutheran pastor and church music professor emeritus Paul Weber encapsulates all the facets of the church. It is founded on faith and sustained by grace. It is the place where the gospel is proclaimed and where the sacraments of baptism and communion are administered. It is where we learn and pray and grow in gifts of the Spirit, which we then carry out into the world to serve God and our neighbors in justice and peace. In the Central States Synod of the ELCA, it was the winning hymn to celebrate the five-hundredth anniversary of the Reformation. - relcarlington.org

Lord Jesus, think on me

Synesius of Cyrene, c. 375-430

Of aristocratic family in North Africa, Synesius wrote nine hymns stating Christian doctrine in terms of neo-platonic philosophy. The hymn is a prayer of Jesus' help in all the times of need in this life and at the time of death. Benjamin Britten used this hymn in "Noye's Fludde" during the storm at sea when Noah feared that the ark would sink.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light

Kathleen Thomerson, b. 1934

Thomerson regards this hymn as a scriptural meditation and prayer, stimulated by a host of biblical verses mostly related to light. Thomerson was born in Tennessee, She studied organ with the famous French organist Jean Langlais, the Flemish organist Flor Peeters and the Swiss organist Guy Bovet. - ELW Hymnal Companion

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude: Andante Religioso—Eugène Gigout (1844-1925)

Gigout was a French organist and a composer, mostly of music for his own instrument. The 10 pièces pour orgue (composed 1890) include the Toccata in B minor, Gigout's best-known creation, which turns up as a frequent encore at organ recitals. Also fairly often played, and to be found in the same collection, is a Scherzo in E major. Other notable pieces by Gigout are Grand chœur dialogué (1881), and Marche religieuse. Gigout's works are now available on several commercial recordings.—Wikipedia His Andante Religioso from that same collection is a quiet piece. If you listen carefully, you will hear a canon between the soprano part of the hands and the pedal line that is sustained through the entire piece!

Choral Anthem: Fight the Good Fight—John Gardner (1917-2011)

Gardner was an English composer of classical music. Today's anthem *Fight the Good Fight With All Thy Might* is from the collection *Five Hymns in Popular Style, Op. 54* (1962). Gardner set this hymn text to a rhythmical arrangement with the accompaniment punctuating the choir. Originally written for orchestra and chorus, today the organ plays a piano reduction of the score.

Postlude: Toccata on "Aberystwyth" - David Bednall (b. 1979)

Bednall is recognized as one of the leading choral composers of his generation. He studied for a PhD in Composition with Professor John Pickard at the University of Bristol and is signed to Oxford University Press. He is Choral Director at Clifton Cathedral, Sub Organist at Bristol Cathedral, Director of Bristol Chamber Choir and Chew Valley Choral Society alongside an extensive freelance career. He studied with Dr Naji Hakim and David Briggs and was Assistant Organist at Wells Cathedral. - davidbednall.com His *Toccata on "Aberystwyth*" is a mostly loud French toccata style setting of the hymn tune. The tune is found in various keys, both in the manuals, but also in the pedals.
