Though we vigilantly watch for the promised day of salvation, we wait for what we already have: Christ comes among us this day as the word and meal that strengthens our faith in the promises of God.

WORD

FIRST READING Isaiah 2:1-5

The visionary message presented in this reading focuses on a future day when God establishes a universal reign of peace. Divine decisions will make war obsolete, and the worshiping community responds: "Let us walk in the light of that Lord now!"

The word that Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem.

In days to come the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be raised above the hills; all the nations shall stream to it. Many peoples shall come and say, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths." For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. He shall judge between the nations, and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more.

O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord!

Romans 13:11-14


Paul compares the advent of Christ to the coming of dawn. We live our lives today in light of Christ's coming in the future.

Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

GOSPEL Matthew 24:36-44

The holy gospel according to Saint Matthew, the twenty-fourth chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

Jesus describes his second coming as a sudden, turbulent event that will bring about deep change to our normal, day-to-day lives. Therefore, he urges people to stay awake, be aware, and wait expectantly, because the Son of Man will come unannounced.

[Jesus said to the disciples,] "About that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour."







COMMUNION



The blood of Christ, shed for you.





Today's Music

HYMN NOTES

Wake, awake, for night is flying

Philipp Nicolai, 1556-1608

Sometimes called the "King of Chorales," the hymn is titled "Of the Voice at Midnight, and the wise Virgins who meet their Heavenly Bridegroom" based on Matthew 25:1-13 with other references to Revelation 19:6, Revelation 21:21, I Corinthians 2:9, Ezekiel 3:17, and Isaiah 52:8. Nicolai, who also composed the famous melody, wrote his hymns as meditations on death and eternal life in the midst of the pestilence in Westphalia in which over 1,300 people died in six months.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Lo, He comes with clouds descending

Charles Wesley, 1707-1788

Wesley used the first line but completely recast the rest of a crude hymn by John Cennick (author of the famous "Wesley" table grace, "Be present at our table, Lord"), six years after Cennick's death. The ideas and language are borrowed from the book of Revelation, and the whole is based on Revelation 1:7, "Behold, he cometh with clouds, and every eye shall see him, and they also which pierced him: and all kindreds of the earth shall wail because of him. Even so, Amen." the language is apocalyptic and should be interpreted symbolically, not literally. - Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Christ, Be Our Light

This hymn is structured so that the stanzas press from longing for the signs of the kingdom of God to us as its servants and signs. The refrain that follows is a petition that Christ would be our light and shine in our hearts as the church is gathered by that light.— ELW Hymnal Companion

Rejoice, rejoice, believers

Laurentius Laurenti, 1660-1722

Laurenti, considered one of the finest of pietistic hymn writers, wrote a set of texts and tunes for the entire church year. This hymn, based on Matthew 25;1-13 (the story of the wise and foolish virgins) originally was intended for a Sunday in Trinity, but is usually included in the Advent section. It is a call for us to be prepared to greet the Bridegroom (Jesus) whose coming is imminent.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude: Sleepers, Wake—Margaret Sandresky (b. 1922) and Wachet Auf, ruft uns die stimme, BWV 645—J.S. Bach (1685-1750)

This morning we have two settings of the famous "Wachet Auf" chorale. The first one by American composer Margaret Sandresky is a simple and quiet arrangement in the manner of a pastorale where the accompaniment is in a lilting compound meter (3 notes to a beat). The second setting of the chorale is the first number in The Six Schübler Chorales. The history of this work is relatively straightforward. Around 1746, Bach decided to select six chorales from his cantatas and arrange them for organ. This one is taken from his cantata BWV 140.

During the Offering: Pastorale on "Wachet auf" - Wayne Wold (b. 1954)

Wayne L. Wold (b. 1954 in Fosston, Minnesota) is Director of Music Ministry at First Lutheran Church in Ellicott City, Maryland, and Adjunct Associate Professor of Music (organ) at Shenandoah Conservatory of Shenandoah University in Winchester, Virginia. He reitred in August 2020 after thirty years at Hood College in Frederick, Maryland, where he was Professor, College Organist, and Chair of the Music Department.—Waynewold.com

This pastorale comes from a short partita written by Wold on the chorale "Wachet Auf." This is a typical quiet pastorale (think shepherds and fields) with the tune played on slightly louder organ stops.

Postlude: Postlude on "Helmsley" - James Vivian (b. 1974)

James Vivian FRCO is Organist & Director of Music at St George's Chapel, Windsor. In this role, he has been responsible for providing music at Royal occasions including the marriage of The Duke and Duchess of Sussex and the funerals of Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, and Queen Elizabeth II. This arrangement of the tune "Helmsley" is a French toccata style with the tune played in the pedals.
