



WORD

FIRST READING Isaiah 11:1-10

Isaiah describes the coming of a future, ideal ruler who will renew David's royal line (the stump of Jesse). Gifted by the spirit of God, this ruler will reign with perfect justice. Enmity and danger will be restored to harmony and peaceful coexistence.

A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots. The spirit of the Lord shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord. His delight shall be in the fear of the Lord.

He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide by what his ears hear; but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth; he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked. Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist, and faithfulness the belt around his loins.

The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them. The cow and the bear shall graze, their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox. The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den. They will not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain; for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea.

On that day the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples; the nations shall inquire of him, and his dwelling shall be glorious.

SECOND READING Romans 15:4-13

God's promise to include Gentiles within the circle of God's blessed people has been fulfilled in Jesus Christ. Christians live out their unity by welcoming and encouraging each other just as Christ has welcomed them into God's family.

Whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, so that by steadfastness and by the encouragement of the scriptures we might have hope. May the God of steadfastness and encouragement grant you to live in harmony with one another, in accordance with Christ Jesus, so that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God. For I tell you that Christ has become a servant of the circumcised on behalf of the truth of God in order that he might confirm the promises given to the patriarchs, and in order that the Gentiles might glorify God for his mercy. As it is written,

"Therefore I will confess you among the Gentiles, and sing praises to your name"; and again he says,
"Rejoice, O Gentiles, with his people";1and again,
"Praise the Lord, all you Gentiles, and let all the peoples praise him"; and again Isaiah says,

"The root of Jesse shall come, the one who rises to rule the Gentiles; in him the Gentiles shall hope."

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.

GOSPEL Matthew 3:1-12

The holy gospel according to Saint Matthew, the third chapter.

Just before Jesus begins his public ministry, John the Baptist appears, calling people to mend their ways and speaking of a powerful one who is to come.

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'"

Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruit worthy of repentance. Do not presume to say to yourselves, "We have Abraham as our ancestor"; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

"I baptize you with water for repentance, but one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor and will gather his wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

John of Damascus, theologian and hymnwriter, died around 749

Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, died around 342

Tuesday, December 6, 2022

Little is known about Nicholas, except that he was a bishop in present-day Turkey. According to legend, he was famous for his giving to the poor, and so has become a symbol of anonymous gift-giving.

Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, died 397

Wednesday, December 7, 2022

While a governor of northern Italy, Ambrose was elected bishop of Milan on the same day he was baptized. He was a famous preacher, a writer of hymns we still sing today, and helped lead St. Augustine to faith.

HYMN NOTES

On Jordan's bank the Baptist's cry

Charles Coffin, 1676-1749

When Chandler translated the hymn from Latin he thought that it was a medieval work, but it was by a distinguished French scholar of the 18th century who wrote more than 100 hymns in Latin. Its theme is John the Baptist's announcement of Christ's advent and call to the people of Israel to repent and prepare for His coming.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Comfort, comfort now my people

Johann Olearius, 1611-1684

Based on Isaiah 40:1-5, the text is for Advent but is specially marked for St. John the Baptist's Day, June 24. The author, who was court chaplain at Halle and at one time a member of the philosophy faculty at Wittenberg, included this hymn in his 1671 collection of hymns. The rhythm of the tune suggests a dance for joy at the coming of Christ. - Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

There's a voice in the wilderness

James Lewis Milligan, 1876-1961

The voice crying out in Isaiah 40:3-11 is the stimulus for this text. It was written in 1925 in response to the union of Presbyterian, Methodist, and Congregational churches that formed the United Church of Canada and was first published in *The Hymnary of the United Church of* Canada (1930).—ELW Hymnal Companion

Prepare the royal highway

Franz Mikael Franzen, 1772-1847

Franzen, who served with Archbishop Wallin in the preparation of the masterful Swedish *Psalmbook* of 1819, was born in Finland but lived most of his life in Sweden, where he served several churches before being appointed Bishop. The fine Advent text with echoes of Psalm 24:7-10 is graced with an ingratiating tune from another Swedish collection, *Then Swenska Psalmboken* of 1697.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

MUSIC NOTES

Choral Anthem: Keep Your Lamps, arr. Andre Thomas

Many holy days in and around the month of December connect communities of faith with themes of light and enlightenment, journey, hospitality, and new birth. "Keep your lamps trimmed and burning" suggests devotion to the present and preparedness for the future. The heartbeat-like rhythm in André Thomas' arrangement conjures vigilance and yearning. Thomas, a renowned expert on understanding and performing the Spiritual, writes that, as for many slave songs, the impetus for this one probably came from one of Jesus' parables.— uuchurch.org

Thomas writes, "one can only imagine the song stirring from the soul of one slave listener ... one can only speculate that this song was sung often, when there was a possibility of deliverance."

Postlude: Prepare the Royal Highway—Egil Hovland (1924-2013)

Hovland, a Norwegian composer, was born in Råde. He studied at the Oslo conservatory with Arild Sandvold and Bjarne Brustad, in Copenhagen with Vagn Holmboe, at Tanglewood with Aaron Copland, and in Florence with Luigi Dallapiccola. He was the organist and choir leader in Fredrikstad from 1949 until his death. His many works include two symphonies, a concerto for trumpet and strings, Music for Ten Instruments, a set of variations for two pianos, and a lament for orchestra. His sacred works include a Norwegian Te Deum, a Gloria, a Magnificat, and numerous works for organ, and he was one of the most noted church composers of Norway.—Wikipedia

His setting on "Prepare the Royal Highway" puts the tune in the pedal. The hands accompany with a toccata-like figuration on full organ.
