Today Isaiah prophesies that a young woman will bear a son and name him Emmanuel. The gospel is Matthew's account of the annunciation and birth of the one named Emmanuel, God-with-us. During these final days of Advent we pray, "O come, O come, Emmanuel," a beloved hymn based on the O Antiphons, ancient prayers appointed for the seven days preceding Christmas. On this final Sunday of Advent we prepare to celebrate the birth of the one born to save us from the power of sin and death.



FIRST READING Isaiah 7:10-16

An Israelite and Aramean military coalition presented a serious threat to King Ahaz of Judah. In response, Ahaz decided to secure his throne and kingdom by seeking Assyrian help. Isaiah reminds Ahaz that human attempts to establish security will fail. The prophet gives the sign that is the only source of true safety: Immanuel, God is with us!



Look, the young woman is with child and shall bear a son, and shall name him Immanuel. He shall eat curds and honey by the time he knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good. For before the child knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good, the land before whose two kings you are in dread will be deserted."

SECOND READING Romans 1:1-7

Most of the Christians in Rome do not know Paul. In this letter's opening he introduces himself as an apostle divinely appointed to spread God's gospel. The gospel's content is the promised coming of Christ, and Paul's mission is to bring about the obedience of faith among all nations, including his Roman audience.

Paul, a servant of Jesus Christ, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God, which he promised beforehand through his prophets in the holy scriptures, the gospel concerning his Son, who was descended from David according to the flesh and was declared to be Son of God with power according to the spirit of holiness by resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom we have received grace and apostleship to bring about the obedience of faith among all the Gentiles for the sake of his name, including yourselves who are called to belong to Jesus Christ,


To all God's beloved in Rome, who are called to be saints:

The holy gospel according to Saint Matthew, the first chapter.

Matthew's story of Jesus' birth focuses on the role of Joseph, who adopts the divinely-begotten child into the family of David and obediently gives him the name Jesus, which means "God saves."

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

"Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel,"

which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.


COMMUNION

When giving the bread and cup, the communion ministers say: The body of Christ, given for you. The blood of Christ, shed for you.





HYMN NOTES

Savior of the Nations, come

St. Ambrose, 340-397

The bishop of Milan is known as the father of Latin hymnody. His hymn rings the keynote for Advent, with the seven stanzas providing opportunity to proclaim God's purpose in sending the Messiah and our response to this Good News. Martin Luther's German translation, "Nun komm, der heiden Heiland," was put into English by William M. Reynolds, son of a captain in the Revolutionary War.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

O come, O come Emmanuel

Latin, 12th Century

From the seven antiphons sung in the medieval Roman Church at Vespers before and after the *Magnficat* (Mary's Song), just prior to Christmas, sometime in the 13th century five were selected for a hymn and the "Rejoice, rejoice" refrain added. Biblical references to the Great "O's" are Emmanuel (Isaiah 7:14), Root of Jesses (Isaiah 11:10), Dayspring (Malachi 4:2), Key of David (Isaiah 22:22), and O Lord (Adonai) (Exodus 3:15), The purpose of Advent is to prepare for Christmas, as Lent prepares for Easter.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Creator of the stars of night

Anon. Latin, 9th century

The Latin original, found in a ninth century manuscript in Bern, Switzerland, was appointed to be sung on certain days during Advent. In stanza two there is more than a hint of the hymn "At the name of Jesus." In this hymn the inclusion of a final doxology (a Trinitarian formula of praise) appears for the first time in a Latin hymn.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

The King shall come

Anon. Greek Hymn

No Greek source for this hymn has ever been found, and it is possible that it was an original hymn by Brownlie, a Scotsman whose translations were admired by John Julian, the author of *Dictionary of Hymnology*. However, the thoughts of the hymn certainly reflect the early Greek emphasis on light and salvation. The last stanza ends with a translation of the famous second-coming phrase, "Maranatha" - "Even so, Lord Jesus, quickly come!" - Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude: Nun Komm Der Heiden Heiland, BWV 659 & 660 - J.S. Bach (1685-1750)

The Leipziger Choräle include two 'trilogies': one based on Allein Gott in der Höh' sei Ehr (BWV 662-664), and one on the Advent hymn Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland, of which BWV 659 forms the first section. Whereas Allein Gott concerns the Trinity, here it is all about Jesus, who has three roles in the catechism: sanctifier, redeemer and protector. This chorale arrangement is full of mystical expectation, which is underlined by the 'quiet' recording of this performance. Although Bach borrowed the form from Buxtehude, in style BWV 659 would not be amiss as the middle movement of a concerto in Italian style. All the elements are present: a walking bass, a duet of middle voices (sometimes in canon and sometimes referring to the chorale melody) and a leading upper voice. In the arrangement of the melody in the upper voice, Bach goes much further than his predecessors. Each phrase grows out of the chorale into the most wonderful, spun-out coloratura. At the end of the third line of the verse, the world's amazement is reinforced by a harmonic pause and an abrupt deceleration of the bass – everyone holding their breath – a trick often used by Bach when writing about the birth of Jesus.

Many a preacher remarks at Christmas time how the Passion – the Christian promise of redemption – could never have come about without the birth of Jesus. The two poles are closely connected, and Luther refers to this in Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland with the contrast between light and dark. In his turn, Bach also leaves us in no doubt about it in BWV 660. The whole sombre work is pervaded with symbols of the cross.

In any case, this compact work leaves room for interpretation. The two well-matched bass parts are probably arrangements of viola da gamba and cello parts (the big chords at the end of each phrase are typical of gamba music), but at the same time they could symbolise God as the foundation, or even a duet between God and Jesus – equal yet different. In the curious ending, some people hear how God leaves his son, while others interpret the difficult harmonies as representing Jesus' descent into hell, foretold in the Advent chorale, and the fulfilling of God's commandment.—https://www.bachvereniging.nl/en

During the offering: O Thou That Tellest Good Tidings To Zion—G.F. Handel (1685-1759)

The aria "O Thou That Tellest Good Tidings to Zion" comes from the first part of *Messiah* and precedes one of Handel's famous choruses. It is in a lilting 6/8 meter and features virtuosic passages for the vocalist.

Postlude: Toccata on 'Veni Emmanuel'

Andrew Carter (b. 1939)

Andrew Carter was invited by Oxford University Press to write a Christmas piece for organ based on a seasonal theme. The composer writes about the Organ Toccata on Veni Emmanuel:

As everyone had used the best tunes, I felt my favourite Advent hymn might work well. I had just returned from France having heard Jean Guillou playing the mighty organ at Saint Eustache in Paris and had the notion of a Grand French Toccata in my mind. So I chose the tune 'O come, O come, Emmanuel' which I had also set as an Advent anthem. I thought I would use the same key and adopt the Toccata idiom and allow the tune to weigh in played by the pedals. After a short development section in an imitative style, the theme returns, this time with the notes disposed more than two octaves with the glittering manual figurations above.

The work was first performed by John Scott at York Minster on 29 July 1995.—William McVicker
