WORD

FIRST READING Malachi 3:1-4

This reading concludes a larger section (2:17—3:5) in which the prophet speaks of the coming of the God of justice. Malachi looks for that day when the wondrous power of God will purify the priestly descendents of Levi who minister in the temple at Jerusalem.

See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the Lord of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the Lord in righteousness. Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the Lord as in the days of old and as in former years.

SECOND READING

Hebrews 2:14-18

Jesus shared human nature fully so that his death might be for all humans a liberation from slavery to death's power. Here the writer uses the image of priestly service in the temple as a way of describing the life and saving death of the Lord Jesus. He is the high priest who offers his life on behalf of his brothers and sisters.

Since, therefore, the children share flesh and blood, [Jesus] himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the fear of death. For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.

GOSPEL Luke 2:22-40

The holy gospel according to Saint Luke, the second chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord.

This story is a study in contrasts: the infant Jesus with the aged prophets; the joy of birth with the ominous words of Simeon to Mary; the faithful fulfilling of the law with the presentation of the one who will release its hold over us. Through it all, we see the light of God's salvation revealed to the world.

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, [Mary and Joseph] brought [Jesus] up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons."

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

"Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too."

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.



Thursday, February 2, 2023

Forty days after the birth of Jesus we mark the day Mary and Joseph presented him in the temple in accordance with Jewish law. There they were greeted by Simeon, an aged priest who offered the song "Lord, now you let your servant depart in peace," as well as by the prophet Anna, who spoke of the redemption of Israel.

Ansgar, Bishop of Hamburg, missionary to Denmark and Sweden, died 865

Friday, February 3, 2023

A monk who helped bring Christianity to Scandinavia, Ansgar returned to Germany where he was named bishop of Hamburg. He is remembered for his love for poor people.

The Martyrs of Japan, died 1597

Sunday, February 5, 2023

Christianity was brought to Japan in the sixteenth century by Jesuit and Franciscan missionaries. The religion was suppressed, however, and in 1597 twenty-six missionaries and converts were crucified. Nevertheless, Christianity survived and later prospered.

HYMN NOTES

In His Temple Now Behold Him

Henry J. Pye, c. 1825-1905

Pye wrote this hymn when he was the rector of Clifton-Campville in Staffordshire, England. He intended it for the feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary, what Lutherans celebrate as the Presentation of Our Lord.—ELW Hymnal Companion

Of the Father's Love Begotten

Marcus Aurelius Clemens Prudentius, 348-c. 413

This hymn was translated from Latin by John Mason Neale. It was later revised and a doxology was added by Henry Williams Baker for *Hymns Ancient and Modern* (1861). Though probably conceived as a devotional apology for the Christian faith, the hymn transcends controversy as one of the church's timeless texts. The whole creation from beginning to end, within a trinitarian orbit, sings to Christ the babe as Alpha and Omega.—ELW Hymnal Companion

What Child Is This

William C. Dix, 1837-1898

The three stanzas are taken from a longer poem, "The Manger Throne," written c. 1865 on Epiphany Day. After the author had read the Gospel for the day, Matthew 2:1-12. The tune GREENSLEEVES was already popular in 1580 when a license was granted to two different men on the same day for songs about Lady Green Sleeves. Twelve days later it appeared with a sacred text and has been a popular carol tune ever since.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

In Peace and Joy I Now Depart

Martin Luther, 1483-1546

This is a metrical version of the Song of Simeon (Nunc Dimittis) from Luke 2:29-32. Luther's version was first published in Walter's *Geistliche Gesangbüchlein* (Wittenberg, 1524) between two Epiphany hymns, intended for the Presentation of Our Lord, and printed under the title "Simeon's Song of Praise." Later Luther included it for funerals in Joseph Klug's book for burial hymns.— ELW Hymnal Companion

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude: Fantasy on "Divinum Mysterium" - Gerre Hancock (1934-2012)

Dr. Gerre Hancock left an indelible mark on church music and the organ profession in America. Lauded for his skills as an organist, improviser, and choir trainer, his contributions as a composer have been somewhat overlooked in comparison. A request or commission usually was required to persuade him to commit ideas to paper. Apart from the early Air, all of the organ works were composed for specific occasions, people or anthologies. This body of music offers a window into the mind of this renowned improviser and teacher; his written work is remarkably consistent with his treatise on improvisation, Improvising: How to Master the Art, in its treatment of themes, harmonic language and musical style

Fantasy on Divinum Mysterium (1973) is Hancock's earliest extended work. It is a composition of great variety, progressing from the initial statement in the pedal with bold interjections, through a variation in canon at the third with double pedal accompaniment, a melismatic second variation over a pedal ostinato, a lively fugue, and finally a powerful toccata. The coda takes up the plainsong "Amen" and a final statement of the first phrase played by the right foot rings out over a tonic pedal, often the coup de grâce at the end of his improvisations.—Brian Harlow

Choral Anthem: O How Amiable—Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958)

Simplicity is a keynote in Vaughan Williams's O how amiable, and the reason is the circumstances in which it was composed. In 1934 the novelist E.M. Forster wrote "The Abinger Pageant", a play about the history of England, performed to aid preservation work at a church near where he lived in Surrey. Vaughan Williams's anthem was written to be sung by amateur performers as part of the festivities, and the mainly unison writing reflects this. It also emphasizes the communal nature of the pageant experience, as does the addition of a verse from the famous hymn "O God our help in ages past" at the conclusion.—Terry Blain

Postlude: Processional II from Two Processionals—Robert J. Powell (b. 1932)

Powell is an American composer, organist, and choir director. He has composed in nearly all genres common to church music, including anthems, service music, hymn concertatos, organ music, music for handbell choir, and large-scale oratorios. This second processional is a very straightforward march in D Major following the form ABA. When the first section comes back, it is with thicker chords. The B section is registered a bit softer than the A sections.
