WORD

FIRST READING Deuteronomy 30:15-20

The Lord sets before the people of God a clear choice. Life and prosperity will come to the faithful; loss of the land will be the consequence of disobedience. Choosing life entails loving and holding fast to the Lord. Life in God's presence presupposes the promise made to the ancestors.

[Moses said to the people:] See, I have set before you today life and prosperity, death and adversity. If you obey the commandments of the Lord your God that I am commanding you today, by loving the Lord your God, walking in his ways, and observing his commandments, decrees, and ordinances, then you shall live and become numerous, and the Lord your God will bless you in the land that you are entering to possess. But if your heart turns away and you do not hear, but are led astray to bow down to other gods and serve them, I declare to you today that you shall perish; you shall not live long in the land that you are crossing the Jordan to enter and possess. I call heaven and earth to witness against you today that I have set before you life and death, blessings and curses. Choose life so that you and your descendants may live, loving the Lord your God, obeying him, and holding fast to him; for that means life to you and length of days, so that you may live in the land that the Lord swore to give to your ancestors, to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob.

SECOND READING 1 Corinthians 3:1-9

Human leaders in the church are not the ones who control ministry. Rather they are coworkers who belong to God, the one who truly controls and continuously empowers the ministry of the church.

Brothers and sisters, I could not speak to you as spiritual people, but rather as people of the flesh, as infants in Christ. I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for solid food. Even now you are still not ready, for you are still of the flesh. For as long as there is jealousy and quarreling among you, are you not of the flesh, and behaving according to human inclinations? For when one says, "I belong to Paul," and another, "I belong to Apollos," are you not merely human?

What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you came to believe, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labor of each. 9For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building.

GOSPEL Matthew 5:21-37

The holy gospel according to Saint Matthew, the fifth chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus exhorts his followers to embrace standards of righteousness that exceed legal requirements and traditional expectations.

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not murder'; and 'whoever murders shall be liable to judgment.' But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgment; and if you insult a brother or sister, you will be liable to the council; and if you say, 'You fool,' you will be liable to the hell of fire. So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift. Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are on the way to court with him, or your accuser may hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison. Truly I tell you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny.

"You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to be thrown into hell. And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to go into hell.

"It was also said, Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' But I say to you that anyone who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, causes her to commit adultery; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery.

"Again, you have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not swear falsely, but carry out the vows you have made to the Lord.' But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. Let your word be 'Yes, Yes' or 'No, No'; anything more than this comes from the evil one."







COMMUNION







Cyril, monk, died 869; Methodius, bishop, died 885; missionaries to the Slavs

Tuesday, February 14, 2023

These two brothers from Thessalonika, Greece, were monks and were sent to bring Christianity to the Slavic people. In the course of their work they created a written language, inventing the Cyrillic alphabet for it, and translated the Bible and the liturgy.

Martin Luther, renewer of the church, died 1546

Saturday, February 18, 2023

Though he began his adult church life as a simple Augustinian monk, Luther challenged the abuses he saw in the church, and his work eventually led to the Protestant Reformation. Luther's accomplishments included liturgical reform, translation of the Bible, and creation of the Small and Large Catechisms.

HYMN NOTES

Come down, O Love Divine

Dianco da siena, d. 1434

This 15th century Italian hymn is an example of pre-Reformation hymns of praise and devotion. Many were written by penitents who, frightened by the devastating wars and plagues of their time, sought atonement for sins by a deeper life of devotion. Vaughan Williams' beautiful hymn tune is perfectly suited to the introspective character of the text.—Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

The Church of Christ, in Every Age

Fred Pratt Green, 1903-2000

The author is well known for his willingness and enthusiasm in writing hymns "on demand" for special occasions. In 1967 he received a request from the Methodist hymnal committee of Great Britain for "a hymn which tackled the relationship of Sabbath and Sunday." His willingness also to make alterations is reflected in his comment about *Lutheran Book of Worship* when it included this hymn, "The changes asked for by your committee have improved it." This is a powerful hymn about the mission of the Church.— Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Forgive our sins as we forgive

Rosamund Herklots, 1905-1987

There are few hymns which deal with forgiveness. The author has written, "The idea of writing the "Forgiveness' hymn came to me some years ago when I was digging up docks in a long-neglected garden. Realizing how these deeply-rooted weeds were choking the life out of the flowers in the garden, I came to feel that deeply-rooted resentments in our lives could destroy every Christian virtue and all joy and peace unless, by God's grace, we learned to forgive." This hymn inspires us to be reconciled with each other so that "Our lives will spread your peace." - Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

O Christ, Our Hope

Latin Hymn, c. 8th-century

This was originally a Latin hymn that may have been written as early as the seventh or eighth century. John Chandler translated it and included it in his *The Hymns of the Primitive Church* (London, 1837). In *Hymns Ancient and Modern* (1861) it began "Jesu, our hope." All six of its stanzas were included in *Lutheran Book of Worship* (1978). *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* omits stanza 5 and mildly updates the language in stanza 3 and the doxology that is now stanza 5. The omission does not alter the trajectory—from creation to redemption to atonement to victory over death to our life before God and doxology.—ELW Hymnal Companion

MUSIC NOTES

Prelude: Chorale Prelude on "O Christ, Our Hope" - Robert Powell (b. 1932) & Hymn Prelude on "Down Ampney" Richard Popplewell (1935—2016)

Both preludes this morning are brief settings on tunes sung this morning, LOBT GOTT IHR CHRISTEN and DOWN AMPNEY. Powell's setting can be very well imagined as an improvisation that just happens to be written down. The tune is very prominent; it is stated three times with varying dynamic levels.

Richard Popplewell was an English organist and composer who served at the Chapel Royal beginning in 1979. His setting of DOWN AMPNEY is quiet and features the tune in the left hand with a duet of flutes in the accompaniment.

Choral Anthem: O for a closer walk with God - C.V. Stanford (1852-1924)

Stanford was an Anglo-Irish composer, music teacher, and conductor of the late Romantic era. This anthem is one of his simpler anthems. It was composed to follow his solo-unison *Song of Wisdom* (Ecclesiasticus 24). This anthem is based on a text by William Cowper, and the melody is taken from the *Scottish Psalter*. Deeply anxious for a very ill friend, Cowper wrote the hymn in an endeavor "to surrender to the Lord" his "dearest comforts."

Postlude: Chorale Prelude on "O Christ, Our Hope" - Walter Pelz (b. 1926)

This setting on LOBT GOTT, IHR CHRISTEN by American composer and organist Walter Pelz features an fugal introduction starting with the top voices and ending with the pedal part. The tune is then played on a solo Trumpet sound with a sprightly accompaniment.
