THE THREE-HOUR DEVOTIONS 12:00 Noon

For many centuries the three-hour devotions, beginning at noon and concluding at the time of the death of our Lord, have become a time set apart. One experiences the soul's hush as we are confronted with the sacrificial life and death of our blessed Lord. Let your mind and imagination soar. Imagine the road to the cross and our Lord's unconditional love for all of creation. It was for each of us that our Lord suffered and died.

We give thanks today for our preachers who share with us this holy word:

The Rev. Eleanor Abarno, a retired Lutheran pastor, is a member of Saint Luke, and also serves as the Pastoral Liaison to the Women in Community Group. Pastor Abarno currently volunteers as a nave chaplain at Washington National Cathedral, and also serves as a Ministry Associate at Trinity Episcopal, Washington, DC.

The Rev. Charlene Curtis serves as Chaplain at The Village at Rockville, Rockville, MD, providing worship services and spiritual support to residents and staff. Prior to coming to Rockville, Chaplain Curtis served Emmanuel Trinity Lutheran in Frederick, MD, and later St. John's Lutheran in Essex. She also is an Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) Level One Coach.

The Rev. The Rev. Dr. George Lobien, is a retired Lutheran pastor, author, biblical scholar, and noted preacher. He has served congregations in Maryland, Missouri, and Wisconsin. Dr. Lobien is also past president of The Writing Academy, an association of Christian writers who live in various parts of the United States. Dr. Lobien now resides in Williamsburg, VA.

The Rev. Franklin Morales is the Associate Pastor at Saint Luke and also serves as Pastor of La Sagrada Familia, a vibrant outreach to the Latinx Community, in partnership with Saint Luke, and the Metropolitan Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. A native of Venezuela and former Carmelite priest, he joined the staff at Saint Luke in 2018.

Chaplain, Colonel Paul Sutter is Director of Staff and Chief, Space Religious Affairs, Headquarters United States Air Force, Office of the Chief of Chaplains, assigned to the Pentagon and stationed at Bolling Air Force Base, Washington, D.C. Prior to this position, Chaplain served at the United States Airforce Academy, Colorado Springs, CO.

Emma Wagner serves as a Manager for Congregational Engagement at Lutheran World Relief. She is passionate about connecting Lutheran congregations in the U.S. with LWR's work around the world. Emma holds a B.A. in Political Science from Towson University and an M.A. in Public Leadership from The Lutheran Seminary at Philadelphia.

The Rev. Connie A. Miller serves as Senior Pastor at Saint Luke. A native of the Washington, DC area, she has served the Church in Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa, and Illinois, serving roles of congregation pastor, campus minister, and Assistant to the Bishop. Pastor has been at Saint Luke 24 years. The congregation includes a multi-faceted ministry, including a Christian Day School, a Conference and Retreat Center, Hallowood, and an outreach to the Latinx community, La Sagrada Familia.

The First Word

Father, Forgive Them...

First Lesson

Saint Luke 23:23-34a

But they kept urgently demanding with loud shouts that he should be crucified; and their voices prevailed. So Pilate gave his verdict that their demand should be granted. He released the man they asked for, the one who had been put in prison for insurrection and murder, and he handed Jesus over as they wished.

As they led him away, they seized a man, Simon of Cyrene, who was coming from the country, and they laid the cross on him, and made him carry it behind Jesus. A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were beating their breasts and wailing for him. But Jesus turned to them and said, "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. For the days are surely coming when they will say, 'Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never nursed.' Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'Fall on us'; and to the hills, 'Cover us.' For if they do this when the wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?"

Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with him. When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing."

Second Lesson

Saint Luke 23:34b-43

Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews."

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

Seventh Lesson

Saint Luke 23:44-49; Saint Matthew 27:51-54

It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the temple was torn in two. Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." Having said this, he breathed his last. When the centurion saw what had taken place, he praised God and said, "Certainly this man was innocent." And when all the crowds who had gathered there for this spectacle saw what had taken place, they returned home, beating their breasts. But all his acquaintances, including the women who had followed him from Galilee, stood at a distance, watching these things.

At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many. Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said, "Truly this man was God's Son!"


Lord's Prayer


