



FIRST READING Isaiah 55:1-5

SECOND READING

This begins a new section in Paul's letter in which he will deal with the place of Israel in God's saving plan. He opens by highlighting how Israel's heritage and legacy include being God's children, having God's covenants, heing given God's law, participating in worship of God, and receiving divine promises.

I am speaking the truth in Christ—I am not lying; my conscience confirms it by the Holy Spirit—I have great sorrow and unceasing anguish in my heart. For I could wish that I myself were accursed and cut off from Christ for the sake of my own people, my kindred according to the flesh. They are Israelites, and to them belong the adoption, the glory, the covenants, the giving of the law, the worship, and the promises; 5to them belong the patriarchs, and from them, according to the flesh, comes the Messiah, who is over all, God blessed forever. 



Dominic, founder of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans), died 1221

Tuesday, August 8, 2023

Dominic was a Spanish priest who saw the wealth of the clergy as a stumbling block for the church, so he formed itual goals. a movement, the Order of Preachers (commonly called Dominicans) devoted to itinerant preaching and living in poverty.

Lawrence, deacon, martyr, died 258

Thursday, August 10, 2023

As one of the seven deacons of the church at Rome, Lawrence was responsible for the church's financial matters and for the care of the poor. Asked by the emperor to gather the church's treasure, he presented a collection of orphans, lepers, and the like. The enraged emperor had him put to death.

# Clare, Abbess of San Damiano, died 1253 Friday, August 11, 2023

A contemporary of Francis of Assisi, Clare and a growing number of companions established a women's Franciscan community, called the Order of Poor Ladies, or Poor Clares. She inspired other women to pursue spiritual goals.

# Today's Music

Louis Victor Jules Vierne (8 October 1870 – 2 June 1937) was a French organist and composer. As the organist of Notre-Dame de Paris from 1900 until his death, he focused on organ music, including six organ symphonies and *a Messe solennelle* for choir and two organs. He toured Europe and the United States as a concert organist. His students included Nadia Boulanger and Maurice Duruflé.- Wikipedia

"Impromptu" from the 24 Pièces de Fantaisie is one of the most well-known and often-played pieces from the whole collection, along with "Carillon de Westminster." "Impromptu" epitomizes the title with its improvisatory character, and also goes back to Vierne's pattern by using musical ideas from earlier periods as a title. "Impromptu," loosely meaning "improvised," begins with quick 16th-note figurations that do not give a sense of a tonic key, and this lack of tonal center lasts throughout most of the piece. Hence the style creates a very spontaneous atmosphere. — Woosug Kang

Rusty Edwards (b. 1955) wrote "Praise the One Who Breaks the Darkness" in 1986. It was published in *The Latheran Journal* (Minneapolis, 1986) and from there migrated to ten hymnals in the United States, Canada, Scotland, including all three current major Lutheran ones. Written while Edwards was doing a Bible study on the life and ministry of Jesus, it moves from praising the One who breaks the darkness and does other liberating deeds of mercy to the One who makes us one. "It is astounding," says Edwards, "how much Jesus did in such a brief earthly ministry, yet more astounding is how God's blessing and saving acts continue on through Christ. How can we do other than to praise this Light in the darkness?" – ELW Hymnal Companion

At the request of Bishop John H. Vincent, for use at the Chautauqua Bible Study Hour, **Mary A. Lathbury (1841-1913)** wrote the first two stanzas of "Break Now the Bread of Life" in 1877 as "Break thou the Bread of Life." It was published in *Chautauqua Carols* (1878) for use in Sunday school services. *Lutheran Book of Worship* (1878) updated the language and added two stanzas by **Alexander Groves (1842-1909)**. This hymn is derived from John 6, which is where the gospel's eucharistic theology is found, but the hymn itself, as Donald Hustad points out, "is more closely associated with the opening words of the first chapter of John, in which Jesus is presented as the dynamic wisdom and mind of God – the *logos*, or the living Word of God. – ELW Hymnal Companion

Eugène Joseph Bozza (4 April 1905 – 28 September 1991) was a French composer and violinist. He was one of the most prolific composers of chamber music for wind instruments. Bozza's large ensemble works include five symphonies, operas, ballets, large choral work, wind band music, concertos, and many works for large brass or woodwind ensembles. Outside of France, he is best known for his chamber music, rather than his larger works. — Wikipedia "Aria" is dedicated to the famous French Saxophonist Marcel Mule. This quiet lyrical piece displays the singing, lyrical alto saxophone style beautifully.

Sylvia Dunstan (1955-1993) says she went to the meeting of the Hymn Society in 1990 and "had the chance to acquaint myself with the tunes of the *Southern Harmony*. After the conference, some of us vacationed at Folly Beach outside Charleston, where I worked out "All Who Hunger, Gather Gladly," wandering up and down the beach singing the tune HOLY MANNA." The text itself picks up the title of the tune in connection with holy communion and then sets up a series of contrasts between before and after: from wilderness and wandering to truth and being fed, from restlessness and roaming to joy and feast, from loneliness and longing to peace and God's leading. – ELW Hymnal Companion

**Johann Rist (1607-1667)** included **"O Living Bread from Heaven"** in his *Neuer Himlischer Lieder* (1651). It had nine stanzas and was called "A hymn of heartfelt praise and thanksgiving after the reception of Holy Communion." Catherine Winkworth translated eight of the nine stanzas. The first three and the ninth of Rist's original were altered and adapted to the meter 7 6 76 D in the *Church Book* (1868). Lutheran hymnals in this country have continued to use that four-stanza version. – ELW Hymnal Companion.

Charles-Marie-Jean-Albert Widor (21 February 1844 – 12 March 1937) was a French organist, composer and teacher of the late Romantic era.] As a composer he is known for his ten organ symphonies, especially the toccata of his fifth organ symphony, which is frequently played as recessional music at weddings and other celebrations. – Wikipedia Perhaps the Second Symphony is the lightest of all. Its myriad movements exhibit wide ranges of color and mood. This symphony fits well between the seriousness of the First and Third Symphonies. The boisterous and joyous Finale has constant chatter and cascading waves of notes. – Joby Bell
