





FIRST READING Jeremiah 15:15-21

Jeremiah's delight in the word of the Lord is contradicted by the heaviness of God's hand upon him and God's seeming unfaithfulness. God's tough love to Jeremiah says that if he repents, he will be allowed to continue in his strenuous ministry. Jeremiah is strengthened by the simple words, "I am with you."

O Lord, you know; remember me and visit me, and bring down retribution for me on my persecutors. In your forbearance do not take me away; know that on your account I suffer insult. Your words were found, and I ate them, and your words became to me a joy and the delight of my heart; for I am called by your name, O Lord, God of hosts. I did not sit in the company of merrymakers, nor did I rejoice; under the weight of your hand I sat alone, for you had filled me with indignation. Why is my pain unceasing, my wound incurable, refusing to be healed? Truly, you are to me like a deceitful brook, like waters that fail.

Therefore thus says the Lord: If you turn back, I will take you back, and you shall stand before me. If you utter what is precious, and not what is worthless, you shall serve as my mouth. It is they who will turn to you, not you who will turn to them. And I will make you to this people a fortified wall of bronze; they will fight against you, but they shall not prevail over you, for I am with you to save you and deliver you, says the Lord. 

SECOND READING Romans 12:9-21

Paul presents benchmarks for faithful relationships with Christians and non-Christians. Love is the unflagging standard of our behavior. When we encounter evil, we do not resort to its tactics but seek to overcome it with good. While Christians cannot control the actions and attitudes of others, we seek to live at peace with all people.

Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers.

Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave

room for the wrath of God; for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." No, "if your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink; for by doing this you will heap burning coals on their heads." GOSPEL Matthew 16:21-28

The holy gospel according to Saint Matthew, the sixteenth chapter.

After Peter confesses that Jesus is "the Messiah, the Son of the living God" (16:16), Jesus reveals the ultimate purpose of his ministry. These words prove hard to accept, even for a disciple whom Jesus has called a "rock."

From that time on, [after Peter confessed that Jesus was the Messiah,] Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him, saying, "God forbid it, Lord! This must never happen to you." But he turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

Then Jesus told his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life?



Today's Music

Gerre Hancock (February 21, 1934 – January 21, 2012) was an American organist, improviser, and composer. Hancock was Professor of Organ and Sacred Music at the University of Texas at Austin.

The Variations on Ora labora (Come, Labor On) were written in 2001 at the request, and subsequently in memory, of Lewis Brun, a distinguished organist and a graduate of Westminster Choir College, Peabody Conservatory, and the Royal School of Church Music in England. Brun served as organist and choir director at numerous churches on the East Coast, in Newark, New Jersey, Hagerstown, Maryland, and latterly at St Augustine's Roman Catholic Church in Williamsport, Maryland.

Come, labor on is a hymn written by Jane Borthwick. The New Testament passages which liken the winning of souls to the harvesting of grain are the background sources for this hymn. For those who labor faithfully there will be the glad sound at the last, "Well done!". The tune was written by Tertius Noble

John Fawcett (1740-1817), an English Baptist minister in Yorkshire, received a call to a bigger and more prestigious church in London. After preaching his farewell sermon and loading his luggage on the wagons, he decided that he would prefer to stay with his fellowship in the smaller church. In its first publication in 1782 *Blest be the tie that binds* was titled "Brotherly Love." it is widely used as a closing prayer at many church gatherings. — Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Charles Everest (1814-1877), a minister in the Episcopal Church, wrote *Take up your cross, the Savior said* as a youth of nineteen. Jesus spoke to his disciples in Mark 8:34 about the necessity for taking up the cross and following. Everest's hymn describes the fully committed Christian life as denying self, renouncing the world, bearing the shame of the cross, facing all dangers, and following Christ to the uttermost. True discipleship is costly! – Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Both text and tune of the French hymn *Lord Jesus*, *you shall be my song* were composed in 1961 by a member of *Les Petites Soeurs de Jésus*. It is a gentle round-the-world text about Jesus as the song on life's journey. It takes into account the whole creation, servanthood, salvation, worship at the table, fear, and courage. – ELW Hymnal Companion

The original text of *For the beauty of the earth*, written by Folliot Pierpoint (1835-1917), was intended to show Holy Communion as a joyful, holy feast, and the refrain was "Christ our God, to Thee we raise this our sacrifice of praise." Changing "sacrifice" to "this our hymn" of grateful praise has made it more generally a thanksgiving for creation, for our physical senses, for human love, and for everything good which God gives to us. – Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins
