

When giving the bread and cup, the communion ministers say:





John Chrysostom, Bishop of Constantinople, died 407

Women in Community

Wednesday, September 13, 2023

John was a priest in Antioch and an outstanding preacher. His eloquence earned him the nickname "Chrysostom" ("golden mouth"). Appointed bishop of Constantinople, seat of the empire, he criticized corruption in the court. As a result, he was exiled by the empress.

Today's Music

Alexandre Guilmant taught at the Paris Conservatory from 1896-1911, where his students included Marcel Dupré and Nadia Boulanger. His work editing and publishing the then forgotten works of such early composers as Titelouze, Grigny, Clérambault and Couperin, together with an insatiable curiosity regarding the music of his contemporaries, including Liszt, Schumann, Franck, Saint-Saëns, and Widor produced a performing repertory of unparalleled breadth. His programs also included Handel's organ concertos with orchestra, and Berlioz and Wagner transcriptions. Guilmant's formidable energy impelled him to undertake regular extensive recital tours throughout mainland Europe, Britain and America, making a strong impact in the English-speaking world with his wideranging breadth of tas e, and versatility in managing a large range of instruments. *The Scherzo Symphonique* is aptly titled. A scherzo of symphonic proportions, it comes from a large collect ion of organ works Guilmant compiled between 1874 and 1883 as "L'organiste pratique," or, "The Practical Organist." Alternating between loud and soft sect ions, the work concludes with a rousing coda. — Eric Plutz

While earlier hymnodists made paraphrases of hymns, Henry Lyte (1793-1847), who won the prize for poetry three years in a row at Trinity College, Dublin, added a new dimension by making them poetical interpretations. *Praise, My Soul, the King of Heaven*, a version of Psalm 103, includes such memorable lines as "Ransome, healed, restored, forgiven," and "Father'like he tends and spares us." Unfortunately a stanza based on verses 15-17 beginning "Frail as summer's flower we flourish, Blows the wind, and it is gone" is usually omitted. —Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins.

Antonio Lucio Vivaldi (4 March 1678 – 28 July 1741) was an Italian composer, virtuoso violinist and impresario of Baroque music. [4] Along with Johann Sebastian Bach and George Frideric Handel, Vivaldi ranks amongst the greatest Baroque composers and his influence during his lifetime was widespread across Europe, giving origin to many imitators and admirers. He pioneered many developments in orchestration, violin technique and programmatic music. He consolidated the emerging concerto form into a widely accepted and followed idiom.

Sing to the Lord is an adaptation from Deus in Adjutorium, a larger work that sets the opening versicle of the Vespers prayer service, and is set to the text from Psalm 148. It is an inspiring anthem of joy and praise. The interplay of parts and phrases, along with a vigorous tempo, combine to produce an exciting musical presentation.

Draw Us in the Spirit's Tether has had a strange career. Percy Dearmer (1867-1936), the English hymnologist and hymnal editor, included it with the initials "B.R." (one of his pseudonymns) as the second part of a hymn by G.H. Bourne, "Lord enthroned in heavenly splendor" in the famous Songs of Praise. A popular anthem setting by the late Harold Friedell (1905-1958) was arranged as a hymn by the American Baptist church musician, Jet Turner (1928-1984), for the Hymnbook for Christian Worship (1970). The soaring melody is a perfect foil to the romantic and nostalgic text which unites us with the communion of the early disciples. – Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

With good reason Edith Blumhofer says this is the "most popular of all Sunday school hymns." Written by Warner, *Jesus Loves Me!* appeared in the novel *Say and Seal* (1860). In that novel an ill young boy named Johnny asks his Sunday school teacher, Mr. Linden, to sing, and he sings this song in four stanzas. The tune was written by William Bradbury for this text and added the refrain. The version in our bulletin is the Saint Luke version - ELW Hymnal Companion

The word toccata comes from the Italian word *Toccare* meaning to touch. The *Toccata* from *Douze Pièces* (Twelve Pieces) was written by French organist and composer **Théodore Dubois** (1837-1924) It has three sections, A and B, and A. Section A begins at a joyful speed and uses the mixtures and reeds. Then, section B begins in B major using the oboe. And finally, section A repeats and uses the full registration of the organ at the very end of the piece.
