

FIRST READING Isaiah 45:1-7

The prophet announces that Cyrus the Persian emperor is the one the Lord has anointed to end Israel's exile. The Lord makes this choice so that the whole world will recognize this Lord as the only God. Persia had a god of light and a god of darkness; the Lord claims sovereignty over both light and darkness.

SECOND READING

1 Thessalonians 1:1-10

Most likely this letter is the first written by Paul. Paul gives pastoral encouragement and reassurances to new Christians living in an antagonistic environment. Their commitment of faith, love, and hope makes them a model for other new Christian communities.

Paul, Silvanus, and Timothy,

To the church of the Thessalonians in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ: Grace to you and peace.

We always give thanks to God for all of you and mention you in our prayers, constantly remembering before our God and Father your work of faith and labor of love and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ. For we know, brothers and sisters beloved by God, that he has chosen you, because our message of the gospel came to you not in word only, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction; just as you know what kind of persons we proved to be among you for your sake. And you became imitators of us and of the Lord, for in spite of persecution you received the word with joy inspired by the Holy Spirit, so that you became an example to all the believers in Macedonia and in Achaia. For the word of the Lord has sounded


forth from you not only in Macedonia and Achaia, but in every place your faith in God has become known, so that we have no need to speak about it. For the people of those regions report about us what kind of welcome we had among you, and how you turned to God from idols, to serve a living and true God, and to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead—Jesus, who rescues us from the wrath that is coming.

The holy gospel according to Saint Matthew, the twenty-second chapter.

After Jesus begins teaching in the temple, religious leaders try to trap him with questions. First they ask if God's people should pay taxes to an earthly tyrant like Caesar.

Then the Pharisees went and plotted to entrap [Jesus] in what he said. So they sent their disciples to him, along with the Herodians, saying, "Teacher, we know that you are sincere, and teach the way of God in accordance with truth, and show deference to no one; for you do not regard people with partiality. Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor, or not?" But Jesus, aware of their malice, said, "Why are you putting me to the test, you hypocrites? Show me the coin used for the tax." And they brought him a denarius. Then he said to them, "Whose head is this, and whose title?" They answered, "The emperor's." Then he said to them, "Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's." When they heard this, they were amazed; and they left him and went away.







James of Jerusalem, martyr, died around 62 *Monday, October 23, 2023*

One of three early-church leaders named James, this man is identified in the New Testament and by a historian of the time as a brother of Jesus. Scholars are uncertain whether this means a blood brother. He was a leader of the church in Jerusalem.

Philipp Nicolai, died 1608; Johann Heermann, died 1647; Paul Gerhardt, died 1676; hymnwriters

Thursday, October 26, 2023

These great hymnwriters all worked in seventeenth-century Germany in times of war and plague. Nicolai, a pastor, lost 1,300 parishioners to plague, 170 in one week. He wrote "O Morning

Star, how fair and bright" and "Wake, awake, for night is flying." Heermann's hymns, including "Ah, holy Jesus," often express the emotions of faith. Gerhardt, perhaps the greatest Lutheran hymnwriter, was a pastor in Berlin.

Simon and Jude, Apostles Saturday, October 28, 2023

We know little about these apostles. Simon is listed as "the zealot" or Cananean in New Testament lists. Jude, also called Thaddeus, asked Jesus at the last supper why he had revealed himself to the disciples but not to the world.

Minnesota composer **Robert Buckley Farlee** (b. 1950) is Associate Pastor and Director of Music at Christ Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. Bob Farlee and his wife Jane Buckley-Farlee were ordained in 1980, in St. Louis, Missouri, at Unity Lutheran Church, Bel-Nor, where Bob served as music director. In November 1981, Bob joined the staff at Christ Church Lutheran, Minneapolis, where he has served both as a pastor and cantor. Farlee is a graduate of Christ Seminary-Seminex, St. Louis, Missouri, serves on the worship editorial staff at Augsburg Fortress Publishers, and was deeply involved in the recent publication of Evangelical Lutheran Worship, the new book of worship for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. – vocalessence.com

The *Voluntary on 'Thaxted'* begins with an introduction hinting at the tune with a running left hand pattern. The tune proper is then played in the left hand on a reed stop and then migrates to the right hand.

A renowned composer, choral director, organist and educator, **Dr. Walter Pelz (b. 1926)** regularly performs recitals, dedications, and hymn festivals and appears as a clinician for organ and choral workshops throughout the United States. He has composed several hundred compositions including verses and offertories, anthems, solos, cantatas, hymns, choral symphonies, and organ works—many with instruments. He is affiliated with nine publishers. Most of his compositions are the result of commissions from colleges, churches, publishers, corporations, and private individuals. Several of his hymn tunes and harmonizations are included in recent hymnal supplements. Most recently he produced the CD Joy is Sounding for the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians (ALCM) which was released in 2002 and is available through them. His compositions have been performed in churches, colleges, and on radio and television in the United States and Europe. – cuchicago.edu

His short setting on CWM RHONDDA starts with a brief ritornello (refrain). The tune is then played in the left hand one phrase at a time in alternation with the ritornello.

Choral Anthem

This Sunday's anthem *Give almes of thy goods* is the most tasteful stewardship anthem I know. I have said this for years, and I believe it to be true. Rather than "please turn in your pledge card," this anthem text requests us to "give almes of thy goods." How proper and gracious is this?

The text is from the Book of Tobit, a book in the Catholic and Orthodox editions of the Holy Bible. Tobit is one of the apocryphal (non-canonic, extra) books of the Protestant Bible, along with the books of Judith, Wisdom of Solomon, Sirach and others.

Christopher Tye (c.1505-1572) has been called an "innovator" of English cathedral music that was "perfected" by Thomas Tallis, William Byrd and Orlando Gibbons. Tye and Tallis bridged the musical and liturgical styles from Roman to Anglican in the earliest days of the English Church in the mid-16th Century.

He worked closely with Edward VI, the young monarch who called Tye "our musical lecturer." Moving away from Roman plainsong chant, Edward VI had decreed that choirs sing in English and with only one note to every syllable.

Tye graduated with a bachelor's degree in music from Cambridge and sang as a lay clerk in the King's College Cambridge choir. He then became master of the choir at Ely Cathedral, and Cambridge bestowed upon him the Doctor of Music degree. Though not documented, it is assumed he held a position in the Chapel Royal in the 1550s.

About 1560 the Bishop of Ely ordained Dr. Tye deacon and priest within the same year, and he served in parish priest positions until his death.

The beauty and effectiveness of Dr. Tye's short anthem "Give almes" is its simplicity and imitative voice parts. One vocal line leads as all the others follow, woven together like fine fabric. Listen for the words "and then the face" as they culminate in sublime, homophonic chordal treatment of the text "shall not be turned away from thee." – Dr. David Ouzts

Hymns

Michael Perry (1942-1996) wrote *O God beyond All Praising* for the tune THAXTED to supply a text for worship rather than the one associated with it, "I vow to thee, my country." It first appeared in *Hymns for Today's Church* (1982) and is an expansive hymn of praise, as one might expect for an expansive tune such as this. It moves from God's mercies generally, to what God has done in Christ specifically, to our response in Christ. – ELW Hymnal Companion

Sing Praise to God, the Highest Good written by the successful Frankfurt lawyer Johann Schütz (1640-1690) was based on Deuteronomy 32:3 ("because I will publish the name of the Lord: ascribe ye greatness unto our God"). The text speaks eloquently of God's creation, power, love, salvation, mercy and providence with a closing call to remind all Christians that the glory belongs to God – a theme of which Jesus kept reminding his listeners. – Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

Bishop William How (1823-1897), and Anglican, presents effectively the meaning of stewardship in *We give Thee but Thine own*. All that we have is a trust from God, and we must give back the firs-fruits of our labor and our success. Money alone is not enough; we must also care for others in need and remember Jesus words in Matthew 25:31-46: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me." – Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

With heavy Rockefeller financial support, Riverside Church in New York was built for **Harry Fosdick** (1878-1969), one of America's foremost preachers. Non-denominational, the church was opened on October 5, 1930 – a grand occasion which invited self-congratulation and more than a little pride. Fosdick faced the time with hopeful enthusiasm but with humility and sometimes fearful apprehension. To mark the occasion, he wrote *God of grace, and God of glory* at his summer home in Boothbay Harbor, Maine with its call to face the call of Christ to be disciples, and to pray for wisdom and courage to face the hour, rather than to glory in it. – Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins
