FIRST READING Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24

Because Israel's kings proved to be bad shepherds, Ezekiel declares that the Lord will assume the role of shepherd in Israel. The Lord will also set over them a shepherd-messiah, "my servant David," who will feed and care for the people.

Thus says the Lord God: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord God. I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice.

Therefore, thus says the Lord God to them: I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. Because you pushed with flank and shoulder, and butted at all the weak animals with your horns until you scattered them far and wide, I will save my flock, and they shall no longer be ravaged; and I will judge between sheep and sheep.

I will set up over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he shall feed them: he shall feed them and be their shepherd. And I, the Lord, will be their God, and my servant David shall be prince among them; I, the Lord, have spoken.



And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family you did it to me.' Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."







When giving the bread and cup, the communion ministers say:





The first of the disciples to be called by Jesus, Andrew quickly began to bring others to the Savior, including Simon Peter. The Bible also shows him leading some Greeks to meet Jesus, and he brought forward the boy with five loaves and two fish, with which Jesus fed thousands.

Today's Music

Organ Music

John Cook (1918-1984) was an English born organist and composer who later in life emigrated to the United States and served at one of the premier Anglo-Catholic parishes, Church of the Advent, in Boston. Cook's inspiration for *Fanfare* was Psalm 81:1-3: "Sing aloud to God our strength; shout for joy to the God of Jacob! Raise a song; sound the tambourine, the sweet lyre with the harp. Blow the trumpet at the new moon, at the full moon, on our feast day." Sounds in this piece alternate between a bold trumpet and bright, syncopated chords.

Aaron Shows (b. 1989) is a composer, organist, and pianist originally from Montgomery, Alabama. He has played some of the finest European pipe organs in Germany, France, and Denmark, and composes often for the instrument. He is currently the organist at First United Methodist Church in Pasadena. Former teachers include organists Harald Rohlig, Ann Labounsky, and Steven Cooksey. As a composer, his original works have been performed throughout the United States as well as in Europe, and has composed original scores for both feature and short films as well as web series and commercials.

His setting of the tune CORONATION starts with a regal introduction. The tune is then ornamented in the right hand. A brief interlude leads to another statement of the tune. The third statement of the tune is in a different key, softer, and different meter. The piece ends much like the beginning with similar musical material.

Choral Anthem

Michel'Angelo Grancini (Grancino, born in Milan, 1605; died in Milan, April 17, 1669) was an Italian organist and composer. Grancini composed sacred music. Nineteen volumes were published in Milan (1622–29). Some 200 works are at the Milan Cathedral.

Grancini composed religious music almost exclusively, both in 'stile antico' and 'stile moderno'. His vocal writing reflected the seventeenth century, with Monteverdian derivations. His instrumental music shows the characteristics of the sixteenth-century sonata, joining it to the Gabrieli tradition.—Wikipedia

<u>Hymns</u>

Although often sung for Ascension, "Rejoice, the Lord is King" was written by Charles Wesley (1707-1788) for the theme of Easter, where Christ reigns victorious over sin and death. There we "Rejoice" – the keynote of the hymn and of the refrain, based on Philippians 4:4 ("Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice.") – Hymn Note for Church Bulletins

Under the title "Perfect through sufferings" (Hebrews 2:10), the hymn is the story of two crownings of Jesus – the first by the Roman soldiers in mock tribute and the later vision of John where Christ wears many crowns (Revelation 19:12). While many Evangelical hymns of his time have been radically altered, Thomas Kelly's (1769-1854) hymn "The Head that once was crowned with thorns" is so skillfully written that it has always escaped the hymnal editor's scalpel. – Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins

"Blessing and Honor" written by Horatius Bonar (1808-1889) first appeared in his *Hymns of Faith and Hope* (1871). There our first stanza is his last stanza in what he titled "The Song of the Lamb." His first stanza began "Into the heaven of the heavens hath he gone." The hymn as we have it is a rearrangement of his eight stanzas into four. It is a bold metrical setting of the hymn to the Lamb at Revelation 5:12. – ELW Hymnal Companion

Written by **Edward Perronet** (1726-1792), a friend and advisor of the Wesleys who later became a Congregational minister, "**All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name**" has had many alterations. Rippon, famous for including "How firm a foundation" in his 1791 hymnal, added two new stanzas and extensively rewrote the others. Its extravagant praise and "crown Him" chorus become exuberant when sung to CORONATION. - Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins
