THE GOOD FRIDAY SERVICE OF TENEBRAE 7:00 P.M.

We are about to participate in one of the oldest services of Christendom. This service consists entirely of scripture readings, hymns, and music designed to call attention to the fact that we have been accomplices to the sufferings of Christ and yet received his abundant love and mercy.

Our salvation has been purchased by Christ for a huge price and an eternal purpose. This service is a dramatic reminder of this costly sacrifice. Jesus Christ has paid for our salvation with his own life. The silence and darkness of this service reflects the gloom of Good Friday. On that day, even the sun hid its face. The earth trembled! The stark solemnity of this night draws a firm contrast with the Easter liturgy to come. The one candle with which tonight's service ends will once again pierce the darkness of the church nave, and we shall wait in a vigilant and steady hope for the news.

The service begins with a fully lighted Tenebrae Hearse, (7 candles). Jesus has been crucified. It seems that he has lost the battle against death and the devil, succumbing after progressive trials of torment in the bewildering onslaught of evil. Each stage of this fearsome experience is marked by the extinguishing of candles until a darkened nave bears witness to the ultimate consequences of human selfishness. Before the service ends however, even as the darkness becomes more intense, a new light of hope tells us that the powers of darkness cannot overcome the light of Jesus Christ. He who died in our stead reminds us that he will come to us, even in the depths of despair, and draw us to him.

It is written in John's Gospel . . . *That light has come into the world, and the darkness cannot overcome it* . . . even on Good Friday! Christ Jesus is the hope of the world.

FIRST WORD • *Father, forgive them*

Saint Luke 23:32-38

He was despised and rejected by others; a man of suffering and acquainted with infirmity, and as one from whom others hide their face she was despised, and we held him of no account. (Isaiah 53:3)

Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with him. When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by watching, but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews."

SECOND WORD • *Thou shalt be in Paradise today with me*

Saint Luke 23:39-43

Therefore I will allot him a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong, because he Poured out himself to death and was numbered with the transgressors, yet he bore the sin of many and made intercession for the transgressors. (Isaiah 53:12)

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come in your kingdom." He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise."

THIRD WORD • See, o woman! Behold thy son, beloved

Yet it was the will of the Lord to crush him with affliction. When you make his life an offering for sin, he shall see his offspring and shall prolong his days; through him the will of the Lord shall prosper. Out of his anguish he shall see; he shall find satisfaction through his knowledge. The righteous one, my servant, shall make many righteous, and he shall bear their iniquities. (Isaiah 53:10-11)

When the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they took his clothes and divided them into four parts, one for each soldier. They also took his tunic; now the tunic was seamless, woven in one piece from the top. So they said to one another, "Let us not tear it but cast lots for it to see who will get it." This was to fulfill what the scripture says, "They divided my clothes among themselves, and for my clothing they cast lots." And that is what the soldiers did. Meanwhile, standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son." Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother." And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home.

FOURTH WORD • *My God, why hast thou forsaken me*

Saint Matthew 27:45-49

All we like sheep have gone astray; we have all turned to our own way, and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all. (Isaiah 53:6)

From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him."

FIFTH WORD • I am thirsty

He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. (Isaiah 53:7)

After this, when Jesus knew that all was now finished, he said (in order to fulfill the scripture), "I am thirsty." A jar full of sour wine was standing there. So they put a sponge full of the wine on a branch of hyssop and held it to his mouth.

SIXTH WORD • Father, into thy hands I commend my soul

By a perversion of justice he was taken away. Who could have imagined his future? For he was cut off from the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people. They made his grave with the wicked and his tomb with the rich, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth. (Isaiah 53:8-9)

It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, while the sun's light failed, and the curtain of the temple was torn in two. Then Jesus, crying out with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."

SEVENTH WORD • It is finished

Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases, yet we accounted him stricken, struck down by God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed. (Isaiah 53:4-5)

Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last. At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many. Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said, "Truly this man was God's Son!"
