

# FIRST READING

Isaiah 66:10-14


Those who returned from the exile found that the hopes for the glorious restoration of Judah were not completely fulfilled. For these disappointed people, the prophet envisions salvation in the image of a nursing woman. Mother Jerusalem and a mothering God remind the community how they are sustained and supported.

Rejoice with Jerusalem, and be glad for her, all you who love her; rejoice with her in joy, all you who mourn over her—that you may nurse and be satisfied from her consoling breast, that you may drink deeply with delight from her glorious bosom. For thus says the Lord: I will extend prosperity to her like a river and the wealth of the nations like an overflowing stream, and you shall nurse and be carried on her arm and bounced on her knees. As a mother comforts her child, so I will comfort you; you shall be comforted in Jerusalem. You shall see, and your heart shall rejoice; your bodies shall flourish like the grass, and it shall be known that the power of the Lord is with his servants, and his indignation is against his enemies.

- 9 Our God has kept us among the <u>living</u> and has not allowed our feet to <u>slip</u>.


## SECOND READING

Galatians 6:1-16

In the close of his letter to the Galatians, Paul encourages them to live as people made right with God through faith in Jesus Christ. Here Paul offers practical advice about how believers exercise common concern for one other in "the family of faith."

My brothers and sisters, if anyone is detected in a transgression, you who have received the Spirit should restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness. Take care that you yourselves are not tempted. Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ. For if those who are nothing think they are something, they deceive themselves. All must test their own work; then that work, rather than their neighbor's work, will become a cause for pride. For all must carry their own loads. Those who are taught the word must share in all good things with their teacher. Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh, but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all and especially for those of the family of faith. See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh who try to compel you to be circumcised—only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me and I to the world. For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything, but a new creation is everything! As for those who will follow this rule—peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

# GOSPEL READING

Luke 10:1-11, 16-20

Jesus commissions harvesters and laborers to go where he would go and do what he would do. Risking hardship and danger in exchange for the experience of great joy, they offer peace and healing as signs that the reign of God is near.


The holy gospel according to Saint Luke, the tenth chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.** 

After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way; I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals, and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house!' And if a person of peace is there, your peace will rest on that person, but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the laborer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, 'Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near.' "Whoever listens to you listens to me, and whoever rejects you rejects me, and whoever rejects me rejects the one who sent me." The seventy-two returned with joy, saying, "Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!" He said to them, "I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightning. Indeed, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions and over all the power of the enemy, and nothing will hurt you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven."




## COMMUNION


When giving the bread and cup, the communion ministers say: The body of Christ, given for you. / The blood of Christ, shed for you.




# **PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION**

# UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

# Jan Hus, martyr, died 1415 Sunday, July 6, 2025

Hus was a Bohemian (present-day Czech Republic) priest who spoke against abuses in the church, and was seen by Martin Luther as his predecessor in the reforming movement. He was found guilty of heresy by a council of the church, and burned at the stake.

# Benedict of Nursia, Abbot of Monte Cassino, died around 540 Friday, July 11, 2025

Benedict is known as the father of the Western monastic movement. Educated in Rome, he went to live as a hermit, and eventually gathered a community of monks around him. He wrote a rule for living in monasteries that is used by Benedictines and adapted by others.

# Nathan Söderblom, Bishop of Uppsala, died 1931 Saturday, July 12, 2025

A winner of the Nobel Prize for peace for his efforts to unite peoples after the First World War, Söderblom also called attention to the revival of early church worship principles, and helped to lay the groundwork for the World Council of Churches.

# SINE NOMINE – Dr. John Weaver

In the concert organ world, there were two names for many years that seemed to get confused; Dr. John Weaver and Dr. John Walker. With names so close, both Presbyterian Organists, both teaching at the Manhattan School of Music, both monumental figures in the 'organ world,' one can see how they would get confused very easily. Weaver also taught at the Curtis Institute of Music and Westminster Choir College. This arrangement of SINE NOMINE was written by Dr. John Weaver for the rededication of the organ at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, where his dear friend Dr. John Walker was Minister of Music. Over the years there were many issues copyright issues facing this jazzy and very virtuosic marriage of three different tunes: SINE NOMINE and SARUM, both of which are frequently associated with the hymn text of For All The Saints, and infuses the two with O When The Saints Go Marching In. For quite a few years this piece was performed selectively, the music distributely privately and confidentially for fear of copyright infringement. It was years later that it was determined as a copyright infringement overseas but NOT in America! Our Director of Music, Adam Scott Graham was one of the few able to receive one of the original copies directly from Dr. Weaver. A playful introduction of "SINE NOMINE" begins in the hands, adding in O When The Saints... in the pedals underneath the tune. The next part introduces SARUM to the mix in an almost theatre organ style while bringing back SINE NOMINE on top. The piece concludes with a solo pedal cadenza with 16-note scales and up to 4-note chords alone in the feet, followed by the final introduction again of both SINE NOMINE in the hands and O When The Saints... in the pedal.
